
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

This map appears in the Desert Magazine issue for September of 1951 on page 6, and accompanies the article 'We Camped on Kaiparowits' by Randall Henderson. This excellent map depicts the area between Escalante and the confluence of the Colorado and San Juan Rivers (the fifty-mile mountain). Norton Allen (1909–1997) was an American artist and archaeologist who worked in the American Southwest. For nearly four decades he was one of the in-house draftsmen who drew the outstanding maps that appeared in many issues of Desert Magazine. Unique.





Nice view of the students and teachers of the Castle Dale School in December, 1902. We believe this image is by George Edward Anderson, who took several other views of the Castle Dale School and was active in the area at the time. George Edward Anderson (1860-1928) was born in Salt Lake City and lived most of his life in Springville, Utah. A devout Mormon, he photographed not only the Utah of his time but also Mormon landmarks in England, Canada, Vermont, and along the Mormon Trail.



This historic event included anti-nuclear activists, farmers, Native Americans, city dwellers, alternative technology activists, and natural healers.


Portrait of Hillerman seated in his office, looking fresh in his Members Only jacket and Casio. Boldly signed by Hillerman to the left of his face. Tony Hillerman (1928-2008) was born and raised in Sacred Heart, Oklahoma. He joined the US Army in 1943 and won the Silver Star, the Bronze Star with Oak Leaf Cluster and the Purple Heart after being wounded. After the war he attended the University of Oklahoma and worked as a journalist, eventually becoming editor of the New Mexican. In 1963 he went to graduate school at the University of New Mexico and joined the journalism faculty there in 1966. His first Navajo mystery, The Blessing Way, was published in 1970. Over the next thirty-plus years he would go on to publish dozens of widely acclaimed works, most were bestsellers.

Ernie Bulow (1943-2021) was a sometime bookman whose interests and experiences extended to journalism, photography, Indian trading, writing, silversmithing, and teaching. After taking a degree in English in the early sixties he worked for the Bureau of Indian Affairs, living in Gallup and teaching English at Fort Wingate on the Navajo Reservation. Following receipt of a doctorate from the University of Utah, he returned to New Mexico, where he traded in Indian jewelry and Kachinas and opened a bookstore, among other activities





This addendum had a small print run, and was sold out upon publication.

The author of this work was the historian of the Sacramento Society of California Pioneers. He assembled his material from newspaper reports and official state records. This work begins with 'the first political mass meeting in California,' San Francisco, October 25, 1849, and ends with the state convention of 1892. 

First edition in English of the first important book printed in California. Jose Figueroa had been governor of Alta California since 1827. In September, 1834, Hijars and Padres arrived in Monterey as directors of a Mexican colonization project; they expected to take over the mission lands which had been secularized by the Mexican Government in 1833, as well as to assume the governorship and other offices. Figueroa refused to comply with their demands and composed his 'Manifesto a la republica

Mejicana' to recount his side of the dispute and explain his own plans for secularization and colonization. Even as Zamorano was printing the book, Figueroa died in September, 1835.

Inscribed on the dedication page in pencil: "To Saml. H. Dwinelle, Esq. from John Doyle." Dwinelle was a San Francisco attorney who was elected to the bench of the 15th District Court in 1865. John Doyle is certainly John Thomas Doyle (1819-1906), an eminent attorney long involved in the Pious Fund litigation, a Regent of the University of California from 1868 to 1872, a founding trustee of the California Historical Society in 1870, and a scholar who published numerous articles and pamphlets and edited several books. Given Doyle's intense involvement in California's history and relations with Mexico, there is a very strong suggestion here that Doyle was the translator of the work (and perhaps it was he who neatly corrected a date on p.7 from "1853" to "1833"). In the mid-1850s, Doyle successfully litigated on behalf of the Roman Catholic Church of California to regain possession and title of the old Franciscan missions, which had been seized and sold by the government of Mexican California. Nice run of issues of this influential newspaper from Earth First! Earth First! was an environmental group founded by Dave Foreman, Ron Kezar, Mike Roselle, Howie Wolke, and Bart Koehler in 1980 as an alternative to more mainstream groups such as the Sierra Club and the Wilderness Society. EF! describes itself as "pure, hard-line, radical," and advocates supplementing lobbying practices with more direct tactics such as "demonstrations" and "confrontations." In addition to supporting traditional conservation, EF! calls for the re-creation of wilderness through the construction of a national system of ecological preserves in which dams, roads, and other traces of human activity will be removed. "No Compromise in Defense of Mother Earth." Rare.






Nice collection of Western Montana views by the Butte based photographer, N.A. Forsyth. With eleven early views of Morrison Caves, now Lewis and Clark Caverns State Park and seven views of a swollen Clark Fork, showing the high-water of the 1908 floods. Norman A. Forsyth (1869-1949) was a photographer who operated a studio out of Butte, Montana, from 1904-1930, working for Underwood and Underwood and later Keystone View Company.

John C. Fremont's report on his second expedition is one of the single most important pieces of Western Americana. His exploration of the overland trails to Oregon and California was of great interest to an expanding nation, and Fremont (along with his wife, Jessie Benton Fremont) produced a volume as notable for its high-flown style as its excellent content. It was the perfect combination for the era, and the excitement soon generated by the Mexican-American War and the Gold Rush made it one of the most popular American books of the mid-nineteenth century. Born in Albany, New York, he moved to California in 1854, later working there in several capacities, including miner, teacher, messenger, and journalist.



Lovely hand-colored panorama of Jackson Lake, which is in Grand Teton National Park. Frank Jay Haynes (1853-1921) was employed by the Northern Pacific RR in 1875 to take pictures along their route from Minnesota to the West Coast for advertising and promotional purposes. From 1884 through 1915 Haynes operated a lucrative service industry in Yellowstone National Park making and selling souvenir photographs, taking pictures of tour parties, and publishing graphic souvenirs. F. Jay Haynes was known as the "Official Park Photographer."

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

Houseworth was an optometrist and stereograph merchant located in San Francisco. The firm produced many of the best early views of California.



Large collection of the B.Y.U. unofficial student newspaper with 205 issues (of 252) from the first nine years. In 1986, The Student Review was founded as an independent alternative to The Daily Universe and was an attempt to maintain a neutral forum for students of all perspectives. According to Student Review cofounder Bill Kelly, the Student Review published 15,000 copies per week during its peak, distributing them from the edge of campus. The Student Review ran strong for almost a decade before ceasing publication in 1999. Rare.



The Wyoming Wilderness Association was founded in 1979 by Bart Koehler and Howie Wolke to help in the passage of the Wyoming Wilderness Act, which had been years in the making up to that point. The WWA passed as a bipartisan bill in 1984, in legislation sponsored by representative Dick Cheney of Wyoming. Bart Koehler also was a founder of Earth First! in 1980, along with Dave Foreman, Ron Kezar, Mike Roselle, and Howie Wolke.

"None of those areas—and there are hundreds of them across the West and in Southeast Alaska that have been protected by Congress—none of them would have been protected without the grassroots, bedrock citizens that made it all come true." - Bart Koehler.

This large and bright map shows the routes of the Mormon pioneers across the west, Zion's Camp (Joseph and Hyrum's respective divisions) and the Mormon Battalion. Each of these routes is marked by the dates in which these respective groups crossed the area.

An Index at the foot lists: the first baptism, dates and members at the founding of the LDS Church, important places in the early church with short descriptions (Colesville, Carthage, Fayette, Far West, Harmony, Independence, Kirtland), The Missions of the Church with the dates of their founding and their founders, LDS periodicals and the date of their first issue, a list of the foreign language translations of the Book of Mormon, the LDS Temples constructed and a list of Presidents of the Church. Next to the index are the names of the members of the first fourteen companies to enter the Salt Lake Valley.

Inset map of Wayne and Ontario counties that locates significant locations in early Church history and an inset map of the Mormon Trail from Evanston to Salt Lake. This map also locates early Mormon settlements in the west with the names of their founders.

We locate four institutional holdings (LDSCHL, BYU, UU, UCB). Uncommon.

Tom McCarty (c.1855-1900) was a Utah born outlaw who ran the McCarty Gang of outlaws, bank robbers, and cattle rustlers, one of which was Matt Warner. McCarty was an early associate of Butch Cassidy, and according to some accounts, turned Cassidy to a life of banditry.



The intended use for this scrip was the poor, and distributed to them by their local authority or Bishop and could be used as money at the Bishop's Storehouses, this 5¢ note was for meat only. According to Nyholm: "The 5¢ and 10¢ which do not have a cancelled stamp are quite scarce." Nyholm p.337. Rust p.187.

"Governor Matheson had declared June 12th Utah Peace Day in observance of the planned rally at the State Capitol which calls for Utah citizens to gather in protest of the escalating arms race. Demonstrations will be held in cities across the U.S. on that day in conjunction with the 2nd U.N. Special Session on Disarmament." - Washington County News (6/10/1982)

O'Sullivan's work done during this time was later used as a way of persuading Congress to fund military instead of civilian expeditions.





Pictorial card of California that locates a few of the landmarks that are accompanied by brief descriptions. Max Poschin made several die cut pictorial map postcards from his studio in Southern California, through the 1940s and 1950s.

Complete run of the groundbreaking BYU student newspaper, that includes the 'Best of Issue' and the two printed copies of the (watered down) follow-up, University Post. Ron Priddis and Anthony Schmitt, both graduate students at Brigham Young University, founded the Seventh East Press to give an 'alternative voice' to BYU faculty and students. Maxine Hanks and Gary Bergera were co-founding staff members, with Hanks writing the 'Thrills' arts and entertainment feature and Bergera writing the 'Grey Matters' column on theological issues. In an attempt to show both sides of issues, the paper became controversial and was eventually banned from being sold on the Brigham Young University campus, after an interview with Sterling McMurrin (Year 2, Issue 4) where he stated that he did not believe that the Book of Mormon was 'authentic', even though he was an institute teacher more than 20 years before the interview. Rare.


Winhold Reiss (1886-1953) was a painter, illustrator, and interior designer who emigrated from Germany to the United States in 1913, where he taught art for a time at the Art Students' League. In 1919 he traveled to Montana to paint portraits of members of the Blackfeet nation. Reiss depicted his subjects as they were, without the romanticization that many of his fellow artists at the time were using to depict Native Americans. During the summers from 1927 to 1948, Reiss spent in Glacier National Park studying and drawing members of the Blackfeet, these trips were sponsored by the Great Northern Railway, who acquired the majority of these works, and used them in promotional material.


Brigham H. Roberts (1857-1933) was one of the seven presidents of the First Council of the Seventy. A voluminous writer, he is perhaps best known for his outstanding A Comprehensive History of the Church, a major landmark in LDS historical writing from which this selection has been gleaned. Born in England, he was baptized in Utah in 1867, following his emigration. He graduated from the University of Deseret in 1878, taught school, and gradually drifted into journalism. He filled missions in Tennessee (1880-82), in the southern states (1883-86), and in England (1886-88). In 1888 he was called to the First Council of the Seventy; in 1889 he spent four months in prison for "unlawful cohabitation." Elected to the U.S. House of Representatives, Roberts was denied his seat because of his polygamist beliefs. His histories and biographies and treatises remain among the important works of Mormon literature.



This is the quartermaster's report on the construction of a dam on Red Butte Creek in Red Butte Canyon. Geological and hydrological data accompanies site specific information that is illustrated with photographs, maps, and charts. Reports by R.W. Rea, G.F. Loughlin, and D.F. Hewett. Red Butte Creek runs from the Wasatch foothills and is located between City Creek and Emigration

Creek, and was the water source for Fort Douglas since its founding. We are unable to locate another copy of these plans. Rare.


"Red Butte Dam, Work Expected To Start Soon. Work of damming Red Butte creek above Fort Douglas and the construction of a \$370,000 reservoir for the post is expected to start soon. According to post headquarters, First Lieutenant C.S. Sletter has just been designated quartermaster in charge of construction. The arrival of a hydraulic engineer from Washington DC is expected soon." - SL Telegram (4/11/1928)

With the outbreak of the Civil War troops along the overland route were relocated to the east. President Lincoln called for volunteers to protect the mail route and directed Colonel (Brevet Major General) Patrick E. Connor to establish a post near Salt Lake City. Colonel Connor was concerned about secessionist activities in the area and chose a location in the foothills that allowed him to keep an eye on the Mormons. The Post was originally called Camp Douglas, in honor of the recently deceased Illinois Senator Stephen A. Douglas who had been a champion of the West. Over the next fifty years, Fort Douglas provided trained soldiers for the Indian Wars on the Great Plains and Spanish-American War. However, it wasn't until World War I that the Fort experienced major expansion. During both World Wars, the Post served as a mobilization and training garrison, as well as a prisoner of war camp. After the bombing of Pearl Harbor during the Second World War, Fort Douglas also served as the headquarters for the Ninth Service Command, which was relocated from Presidio, San Francisco.







And while she may be a ghost town during the winter months, in the summer a combination of weekend visitors and locale residents make for a busy community. 

The Students and Youth for a People's Peace was a short lived group formed at a conference in February 1971 to promote the People's Peace Treaty negotiated between American Students and students from North and South Vietnam.





Bloomers Cut was the first major obstacle that faced the Central Pacific railroad during the western end construction of the Trans Continental railroad. While the mount identifies this as a Watkins view, it is an Afred A. Hart view, printed by Watkins.

Alfred A. Hart (1816-1908), was the principal photographer for the Central Pacific Railroad during the construction of the Overland Route. He photographed the construction from 1865 to 1869 when the last spike was driven by Leland Stanford at Promontory, Utah on May 10, 1869. Although he worked as a photographer as early as 1857, Hart was trained as a portrait and landscape artist; after his work for the Central Pacific, he continued to paint and was awarded the gold medal for his paintings at an exhibition at the California State Fair in 1872.

Woods, was a stage operator based out of Flagstaff. 'Captain' John Hance (1840-1919) came to the South Rim around 1883 and is reputedly the Canyon's first nonnative American resident. He built a cabin east of Grandview Point at the trailhead of an ancient Native American trail he improved to allow access to his asbestos mining claim in the Canyon. The trail, completed in 1884 and commonly called the Old Hance Trail by historians, was to become Grand Canyon's first tourist trail, as Hance quickly realized there was money to be made guiding wide-eyed tourists into the depths of the Canyon.
