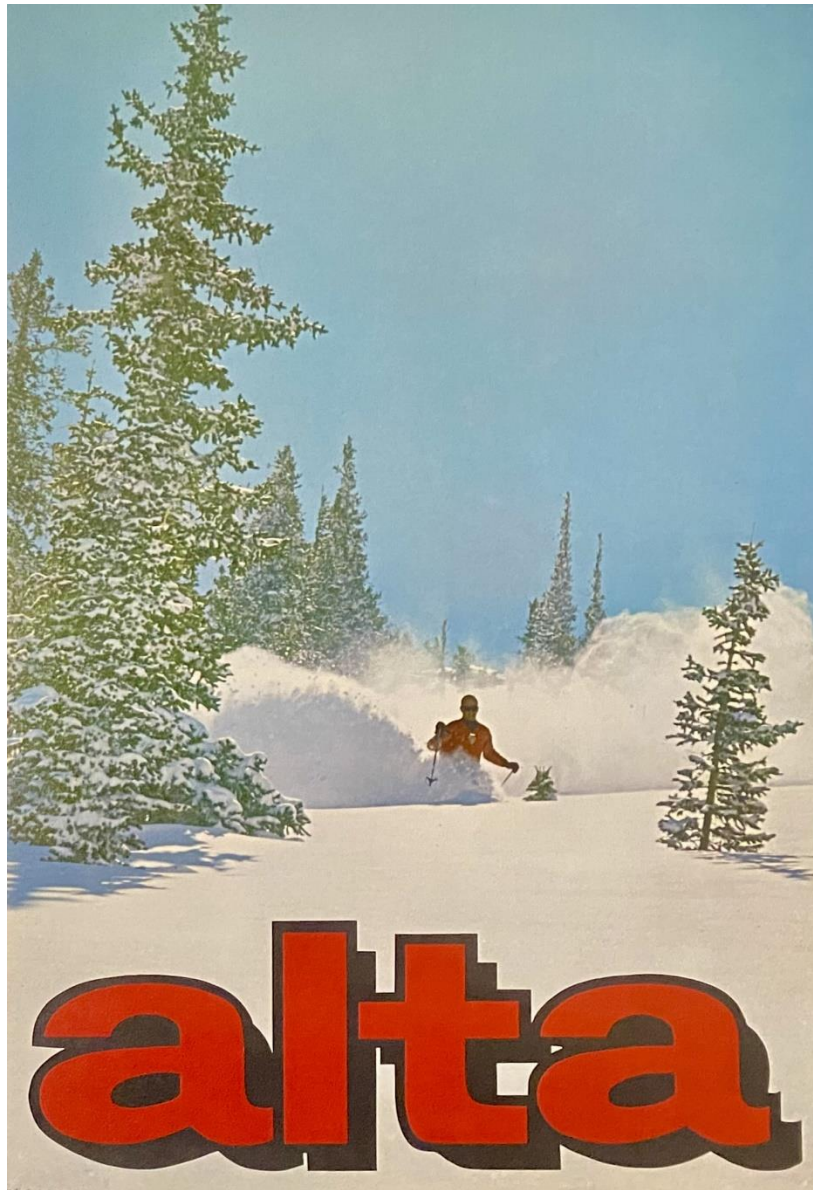

Promotional poster for Little Cottonwood's Alta. Utah's Alta Ski Area is often referred to as a "skier's mountain." It is one out of three ski-only areas in the United States, and for the past eight decades, it provided a unique and authentic skiing experience. Generations of skiers have been coming to this ski haven nestled atop Little Cottonwood Canyon within the Wasatch Mountain Range for its quality deep powder, beautiful mountain scenery, and unfailing snowfall year after year. It was officially designated a ski area in 1938 with the construction of the second ski chairlift in the western U.S. (a couple years after Idaho's installation in Sun Valley).

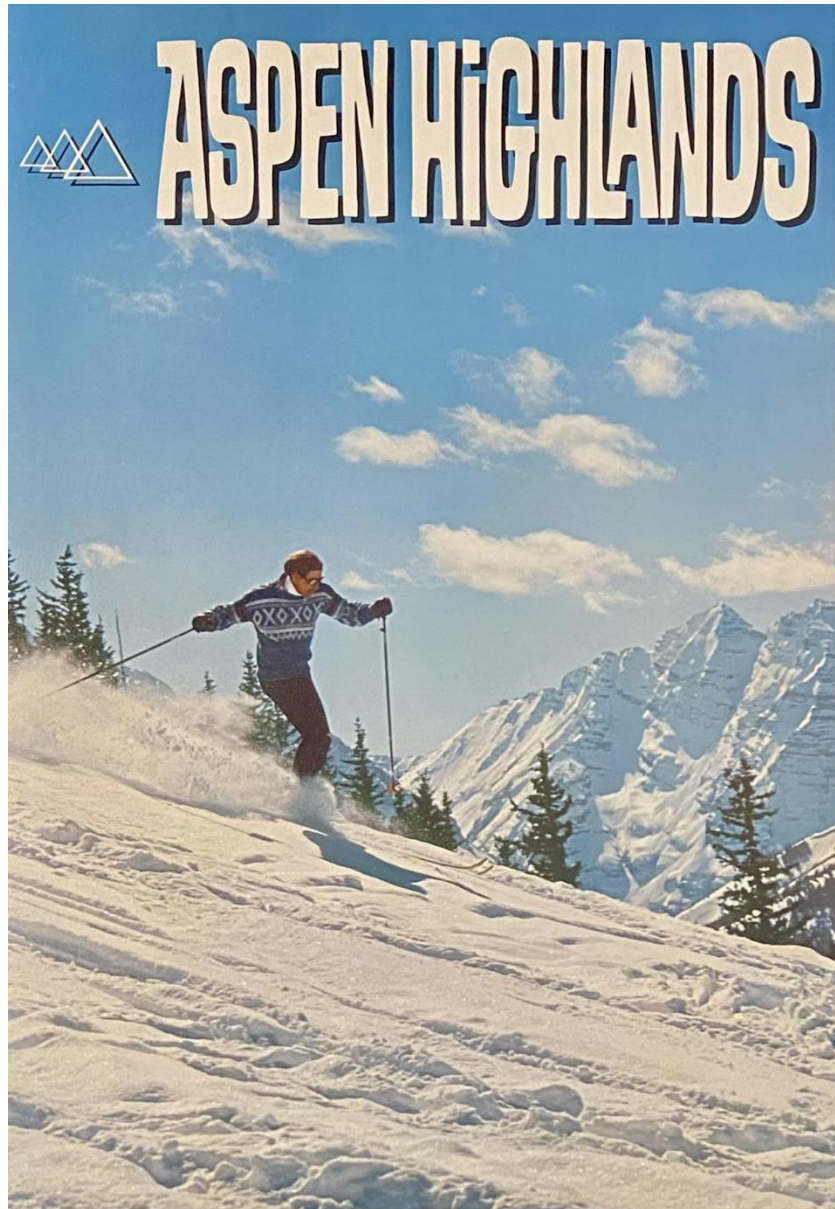

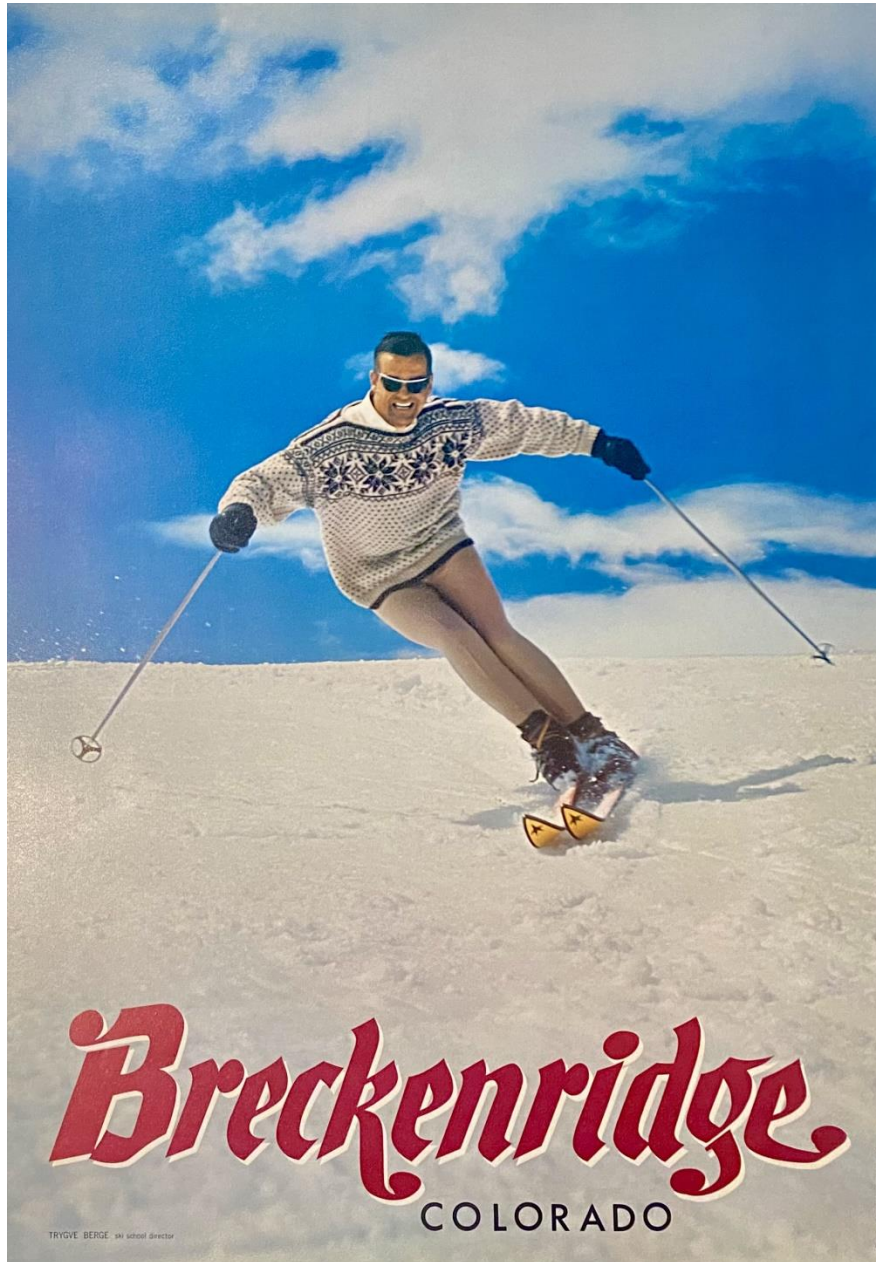

The U.S. Film Festival, began in Salt Lake City in 1978 as a way for founders Sterling Van Wagenen, John Earle and Cirina Hampton Catania to attract more filmmakers to Utah. Redford was its first board chairman. The festival evolved from the U.S. Film Festival to the Utah/U.S. Film Festival to the United States Film & Video Festival to the Sundance/United States Film Festival to, finally, Sundance. The last two changes came about after Redford's Sundance Institute took over the festival in 1985. The Sundance Film Festival is the premier film festival of the Americas and is known for championing fledgling filmmakers and cinematic tastemakers.

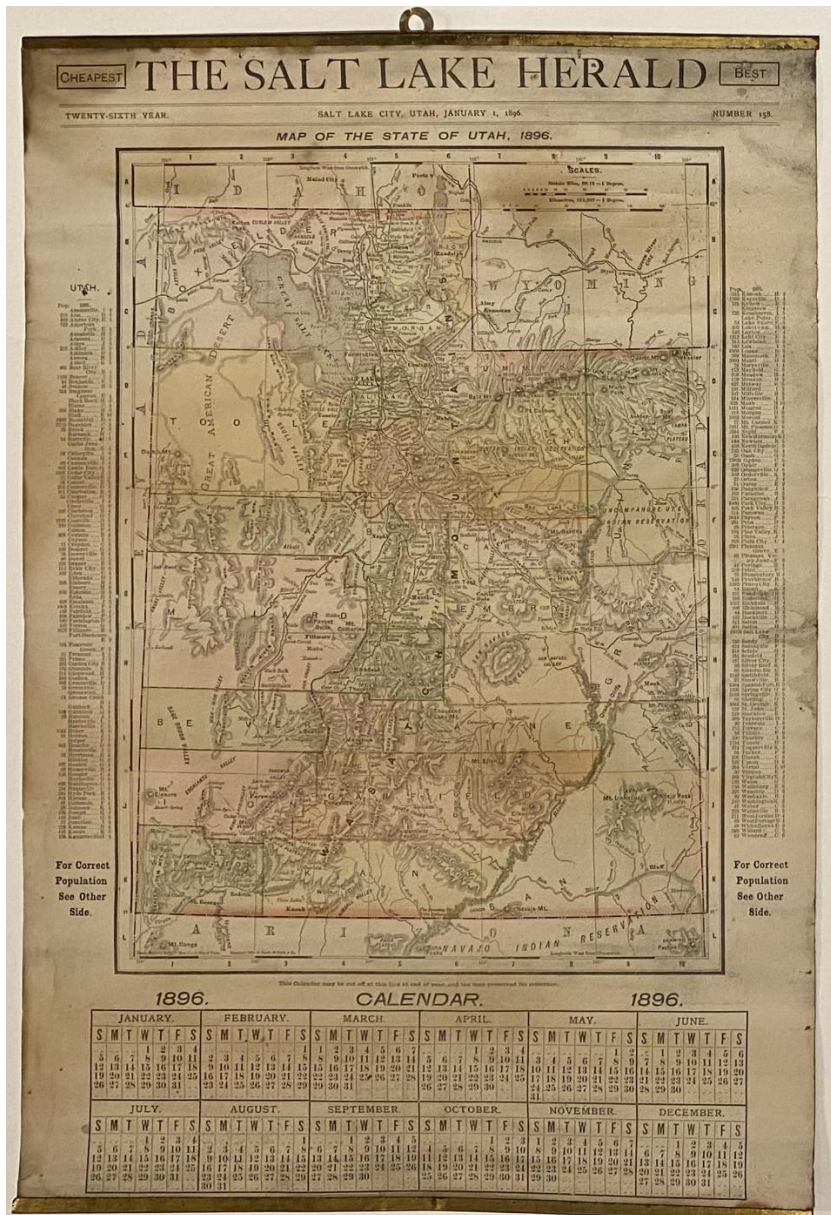

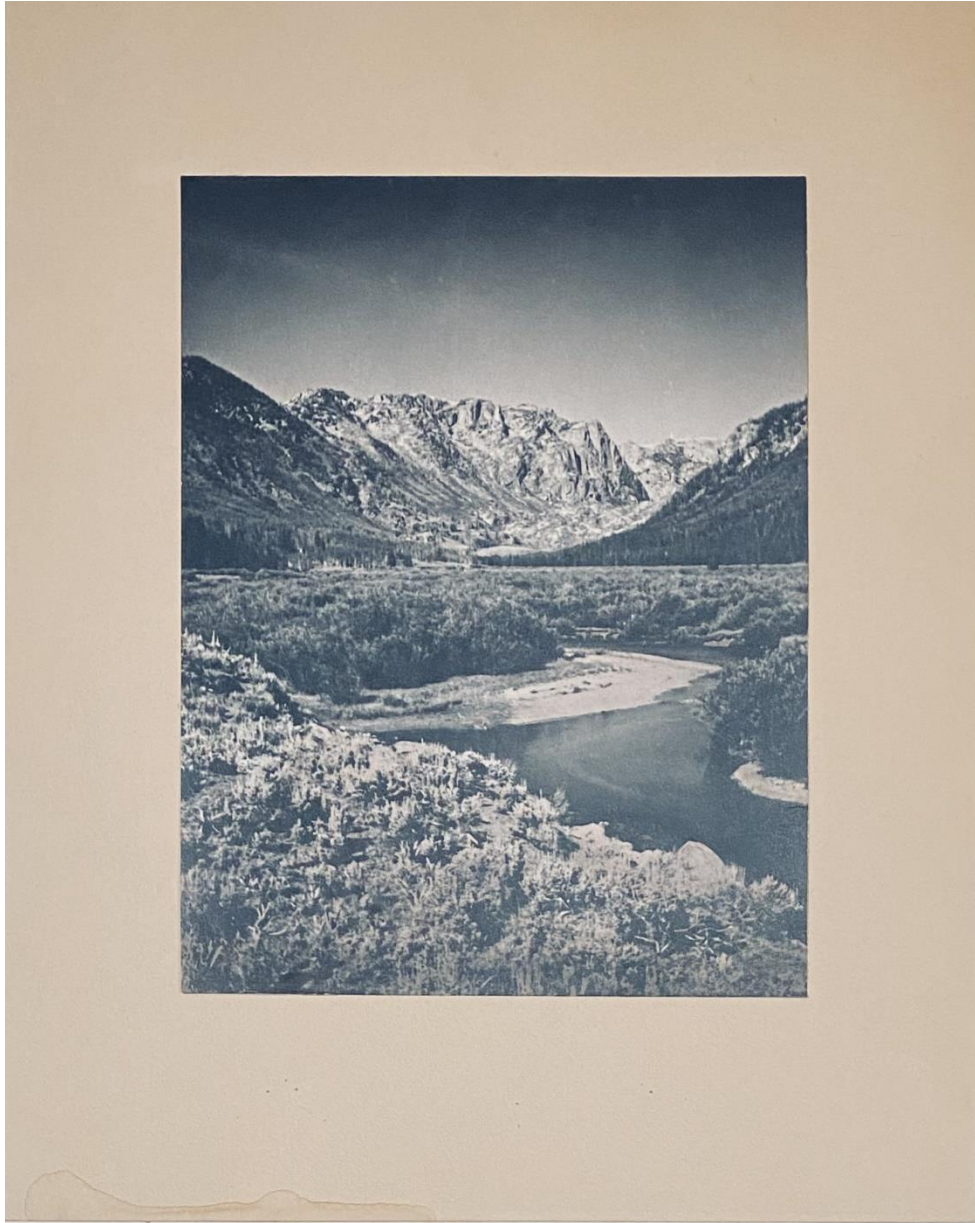

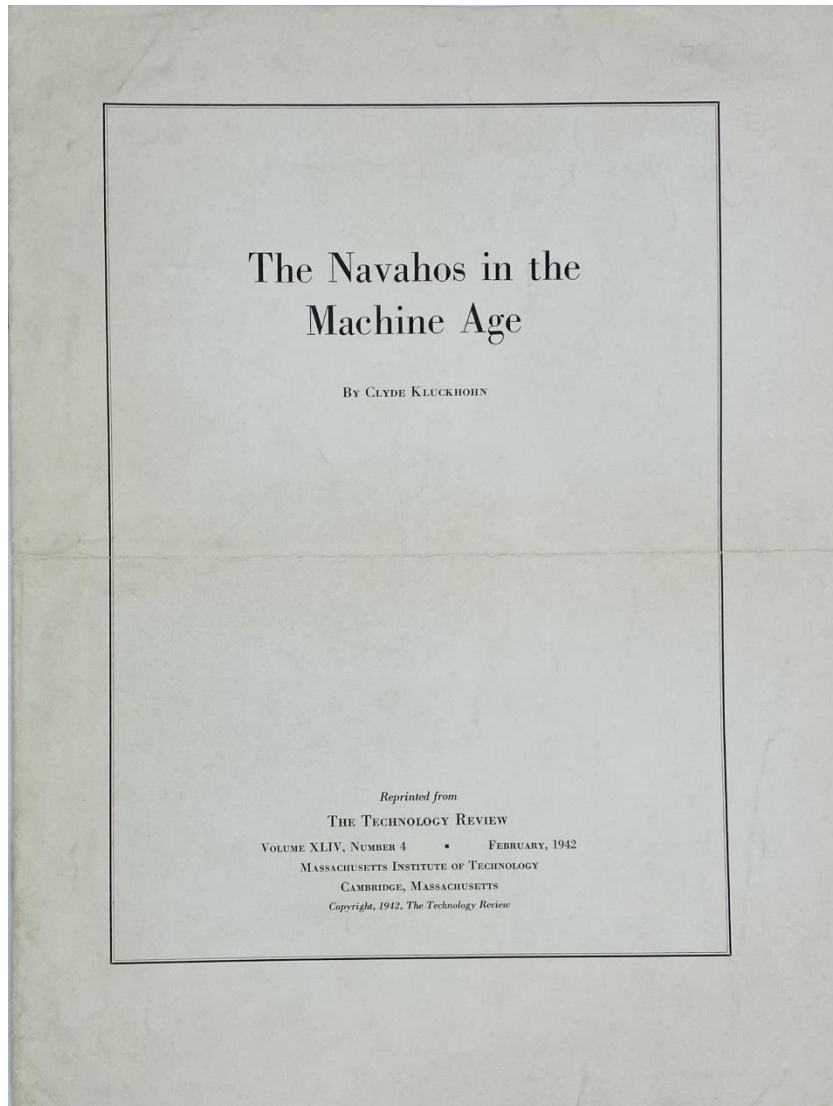

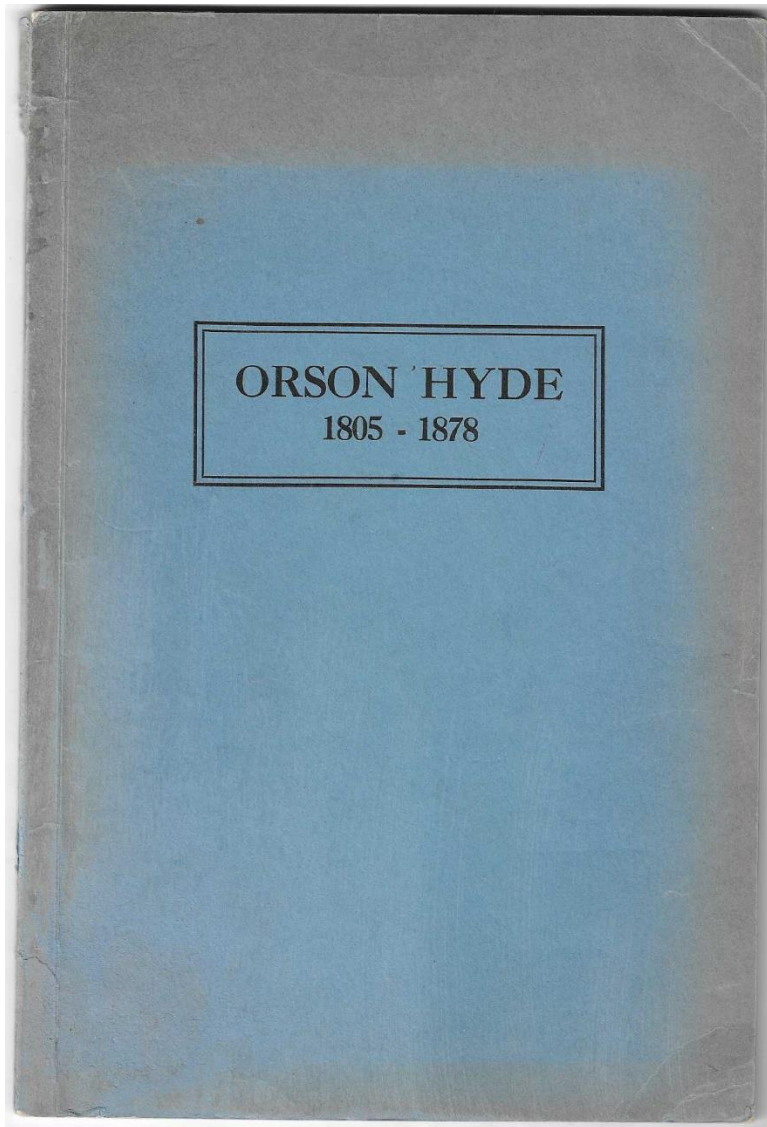

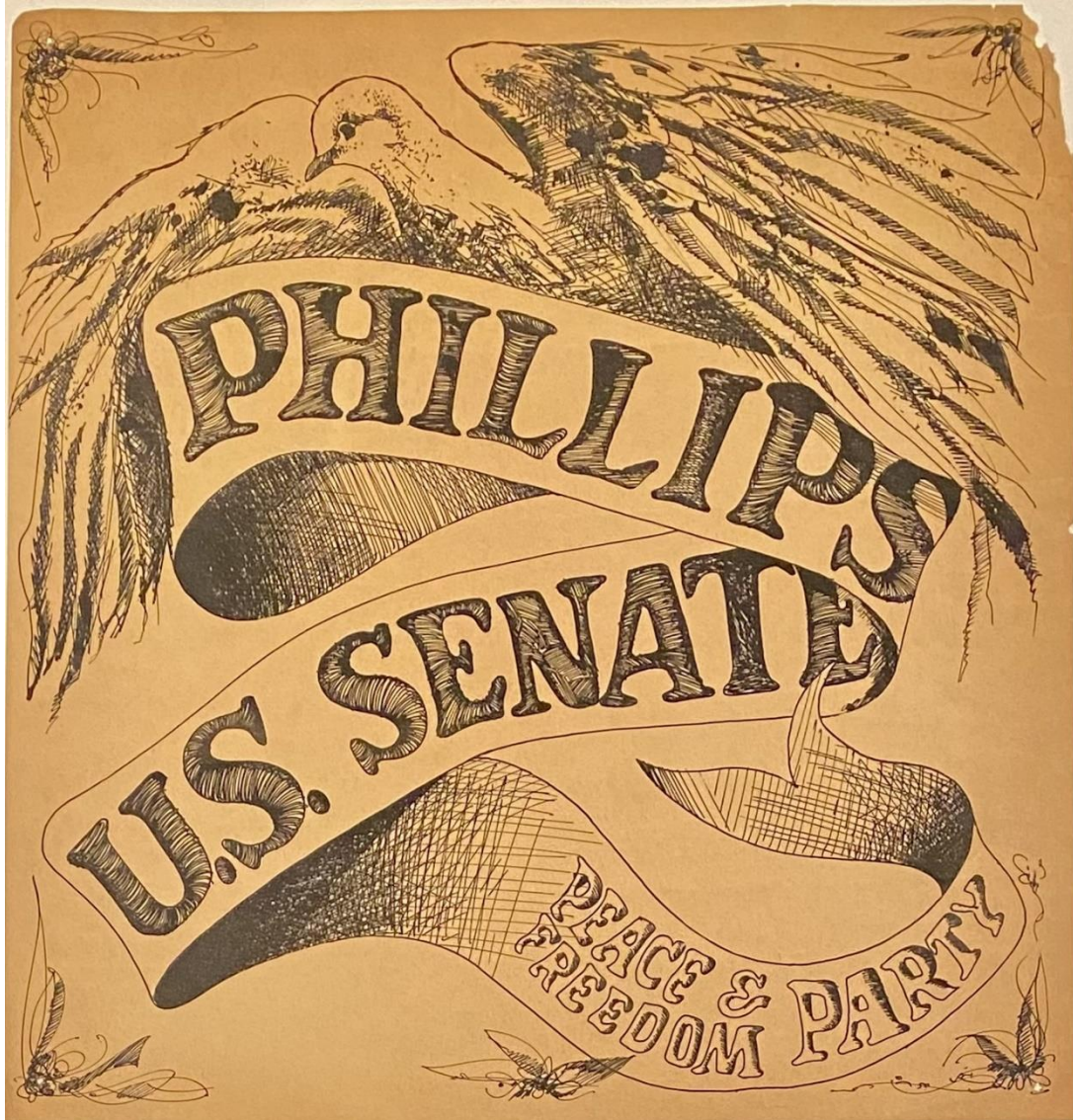

He was the President of the Quorum of the Twelve Apostles of the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints from 1847 to 1875 and was a missionary of the Church in the United States, Europe, and the Ottoman Empire. 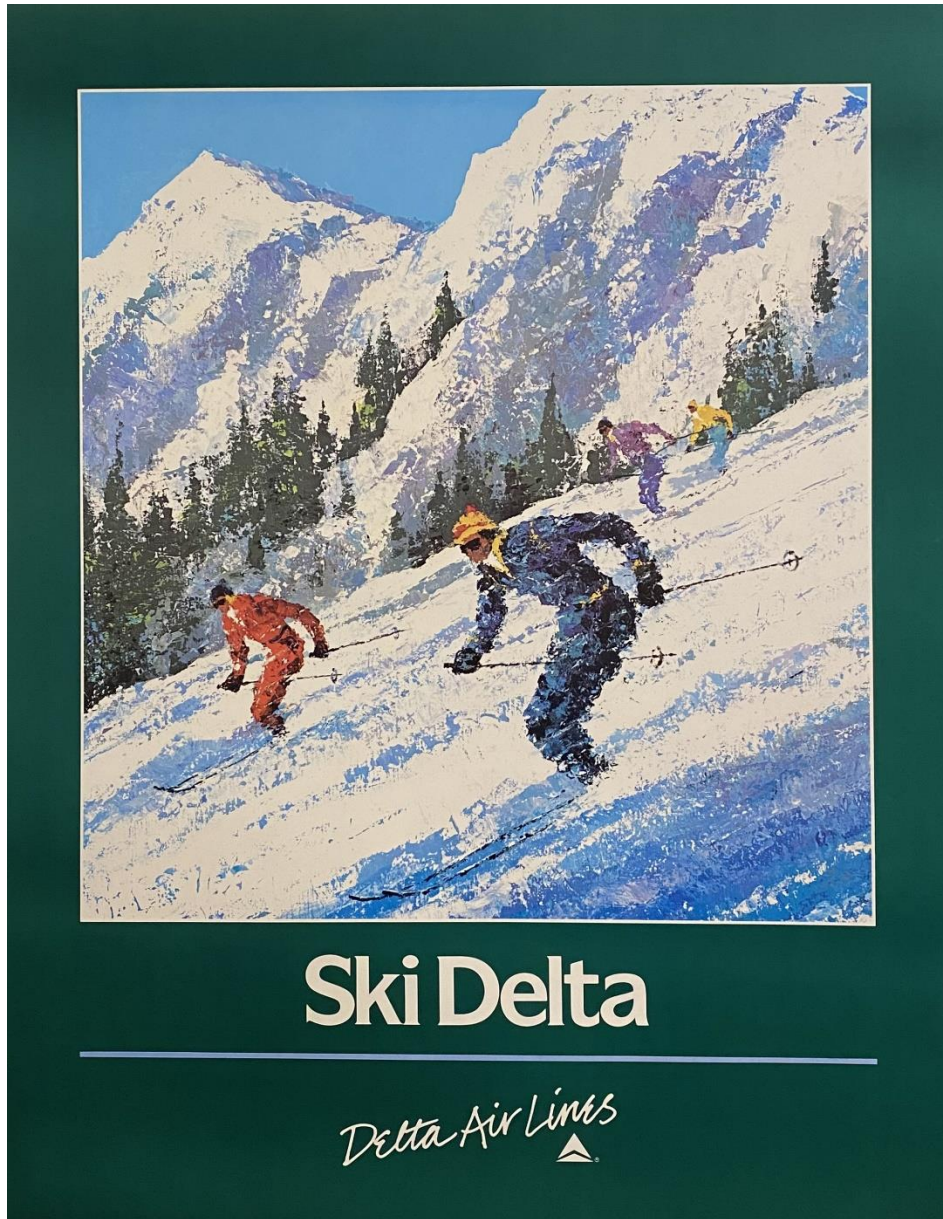

Campaign poster for Bruce 'Utah' Phillips run for Utah's United States Senate seat, he received 2,019 votes (0.5%) in an election won by Republican Wallace F. Bennett. Bruce 'Utah' Phillips (1935-2008) was an American labor organizer, folk singer, storyteller and poet. He described the struggles of labor unions and the power of direct action, self-identifying as an anarchist. He often promoted the Industrial Workers of the World in his music, actions, and words.

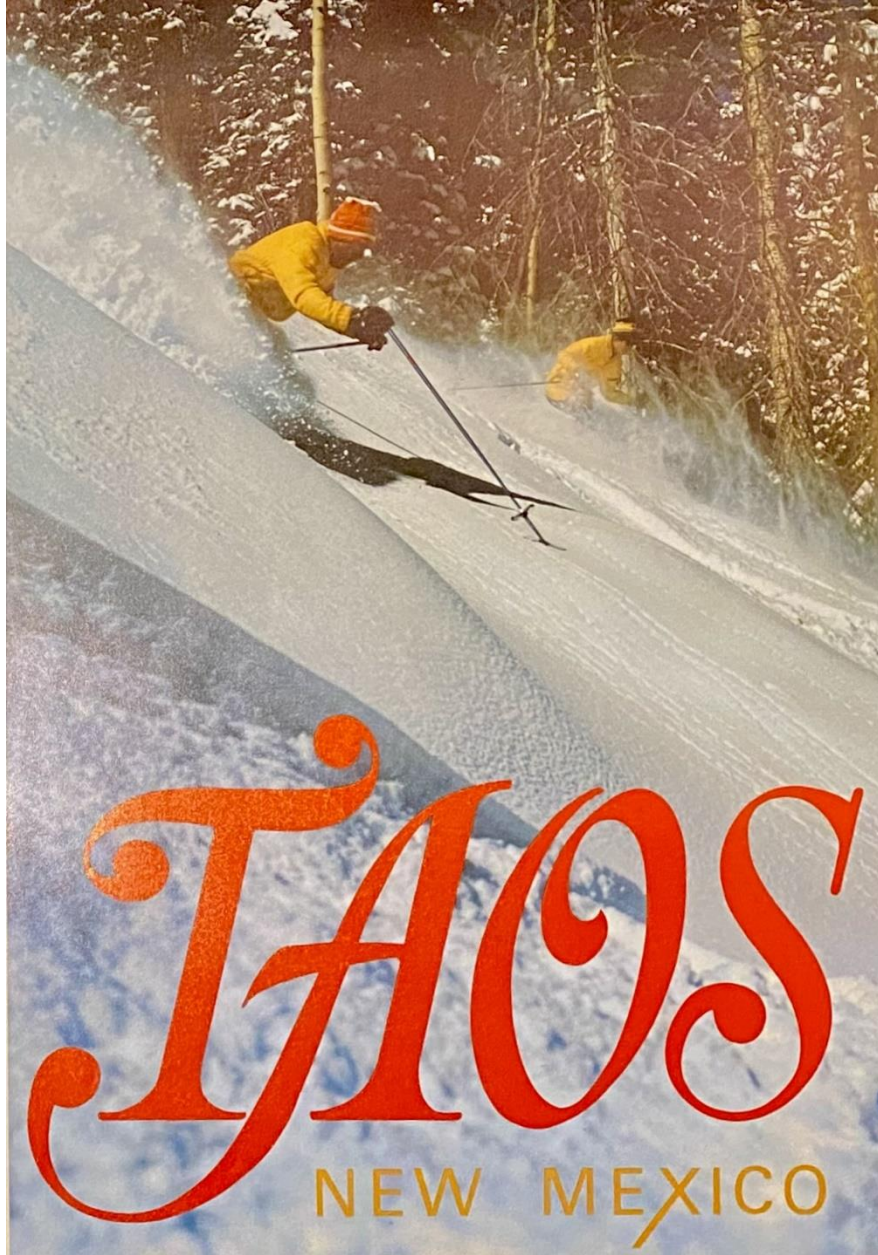

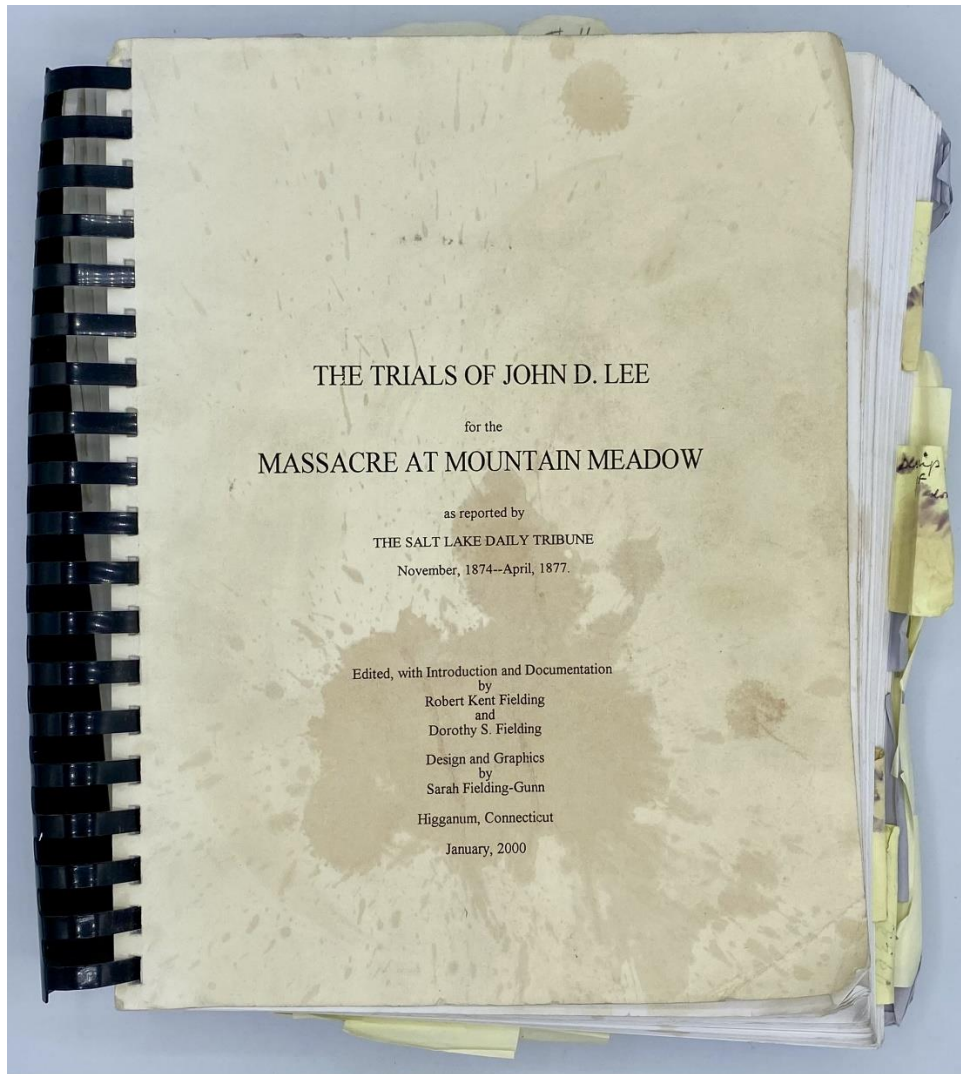

He discovered the area while flying his Cessna 170 between the two ski areas.

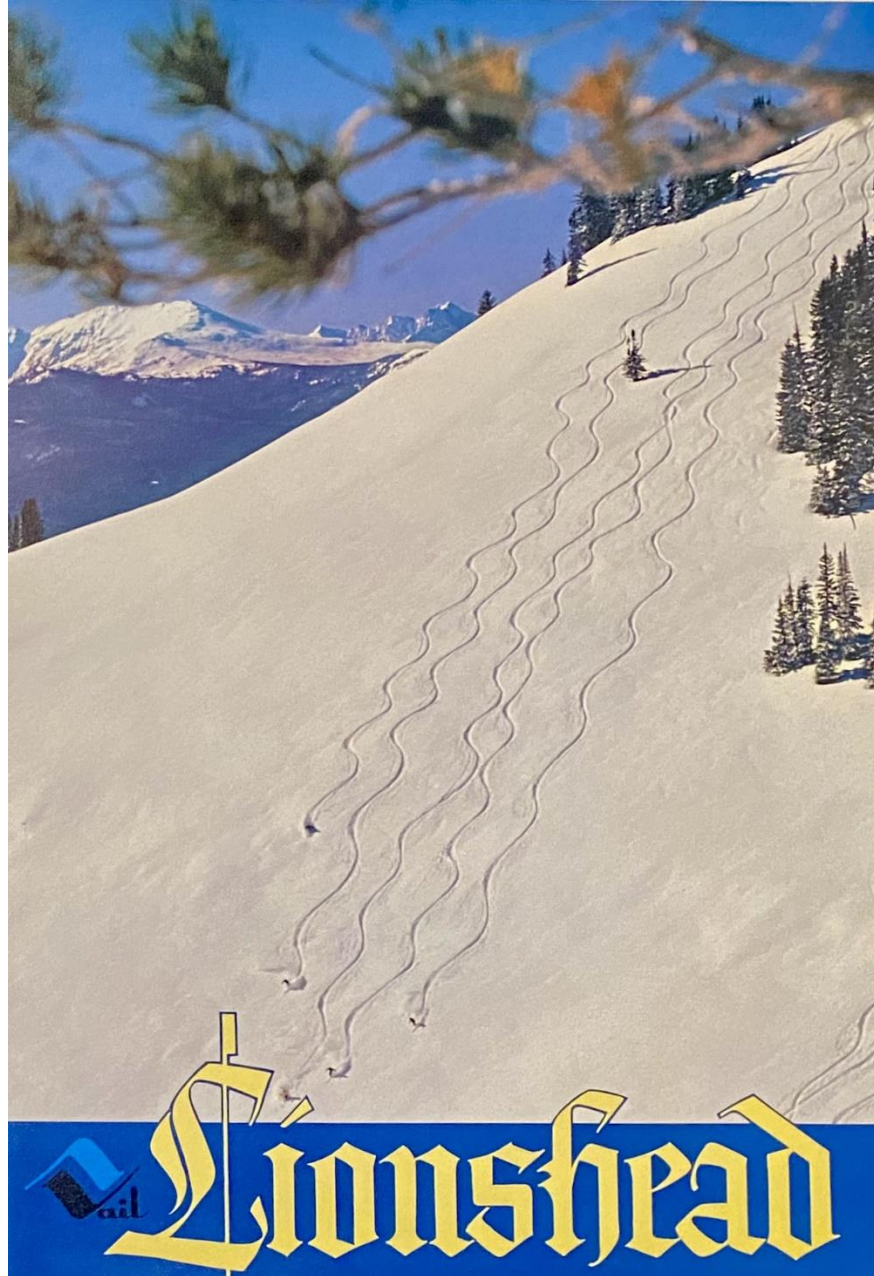

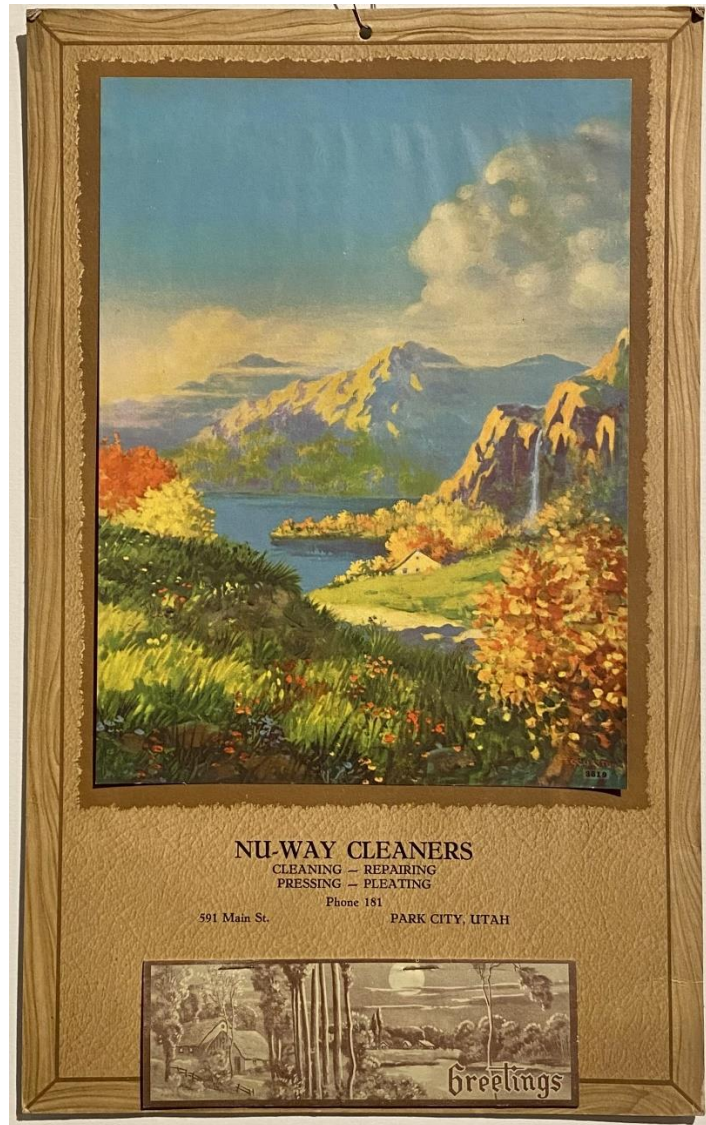

This calendar carries the 216-218 address. Presumed rare.

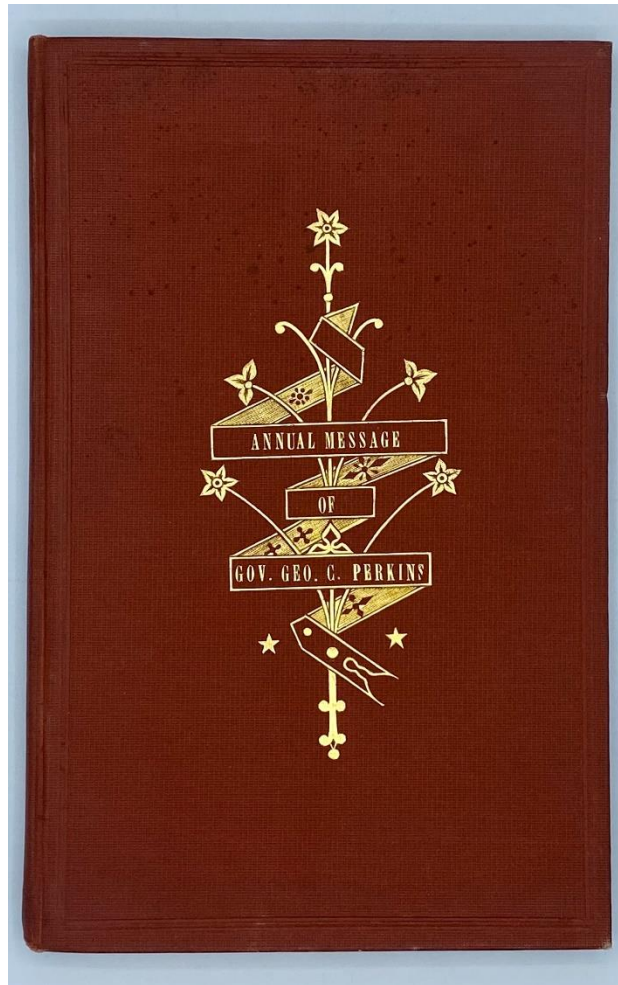

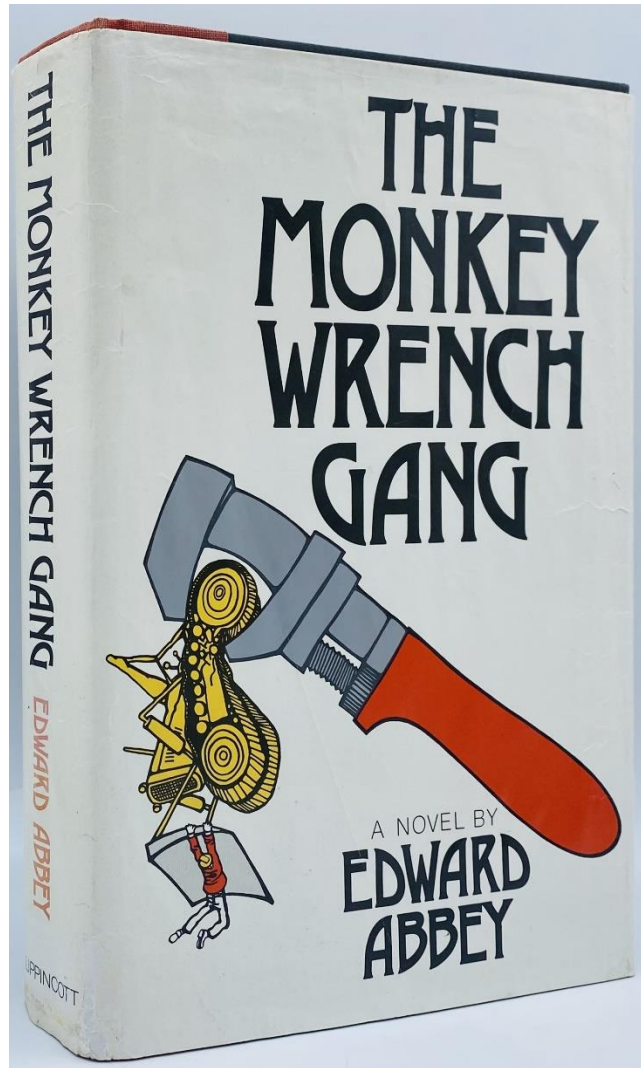

Exlibris Governor George C. Perkins, with his ownership stamp on the front free endsheet. George Clement Perkins (1839-1923) was elected as the fourteenth governor of California in 1880, and his administration was to be the first under the new 1879 state constitution. When U.S. Senator Leland Stanford died in 1893, Perkins was appointed to complete that term. He served three more terms in the U.S. Senate, until 1915, where he was active in naval affairs and the building of the Panama Canal.

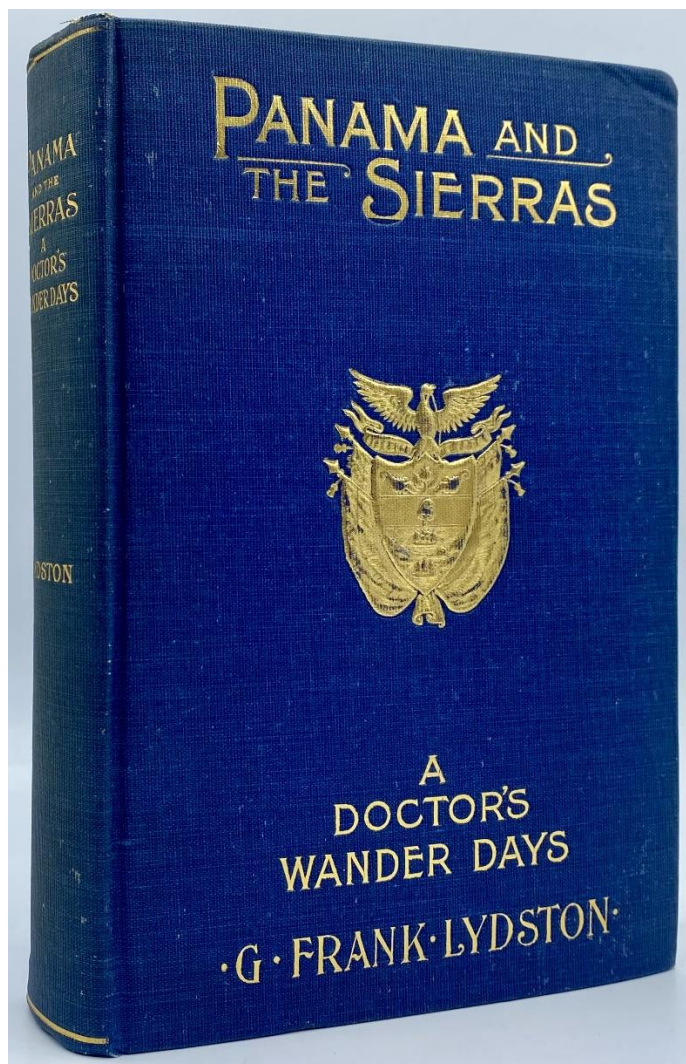

This work is regarded Abbey's most famous and influential novel, that follows the deeds and adventures of Doc, Hayduke, Bonnie, and Seldom Seen, as they protest the industrialization and destruction of the southwest through means of sabotage and "monkeywrenching." Because of this work, the term 'monkeywrench' has come to mean, besides sabotage and damage to machines, any sabotage, activism, lawmaking, or lawbreaking to preserve wilderness, wild spaces and ecosystems. Edward Abbey (1927-1989) was a celebrated author, essayist, conservationist, noted pain-in-the-ass, and in many ways the father (or at the very least, uncle) of the modern environmental movements. 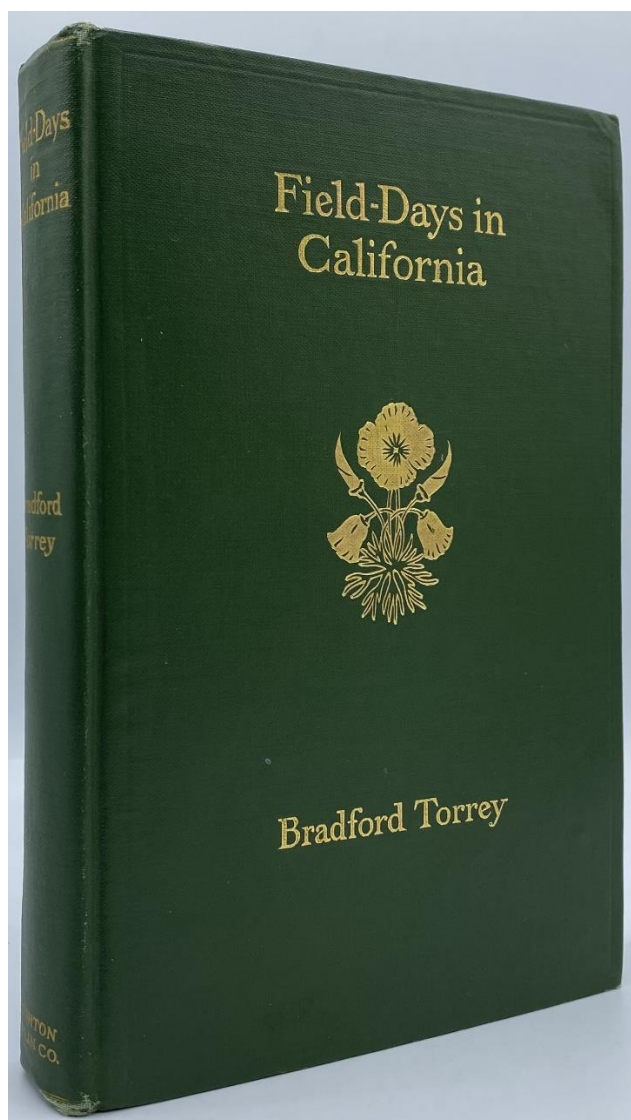

Contains some material on Joaquin Murieta and Three-Fingered Jack Garcia. Lydston claims his father was a member of a posse that chased Murieta. Not in Cowan. Six Guns 1374.

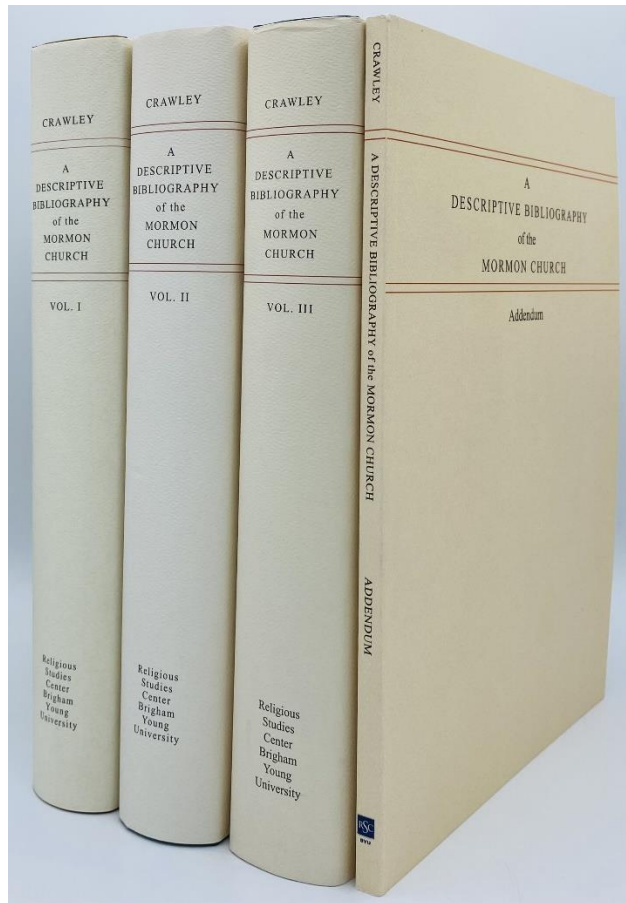

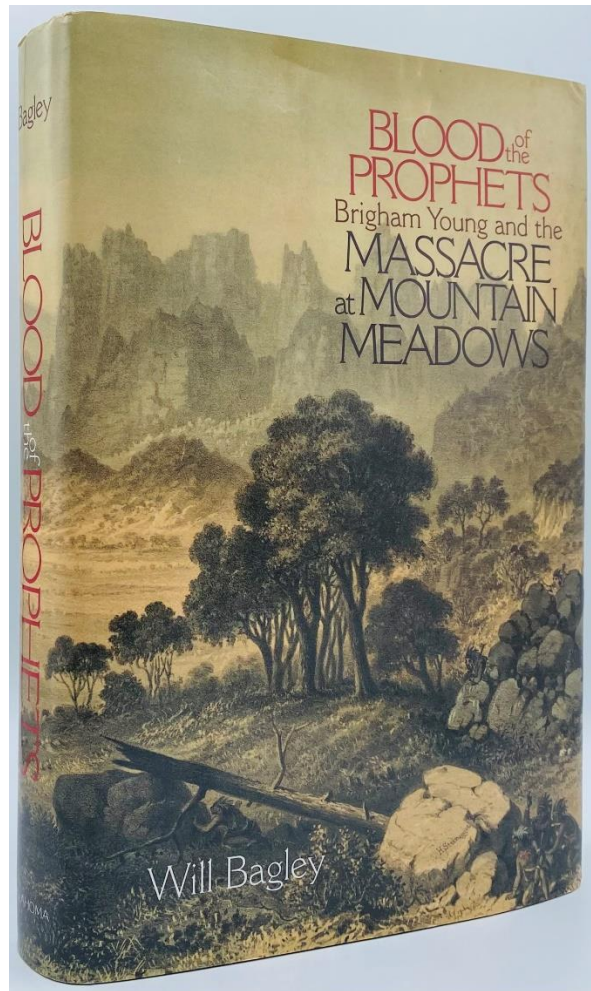

"Mormonism's incunabula are the books of its first twenty-eight years. In large part the Church is defined by these books. They tell, for example, of its birth in New York, of its moves to Ohio and Missouri and then to Illinois, and finally of its trek to a permanent place of refuge in the Great Basin. They report the murder of Joseph Smith, its founder, and the succession of Brigham Young, its leader for a third of a century. They record the efforts of its missionaries who carried its message across the Atlantic, and then to South America, Asia, Africa, India, and Australia. They include its three books of new scripture as well as numerous tracts which introduced and defended its distinctive doctrines." - Vol. 1. pg. 11

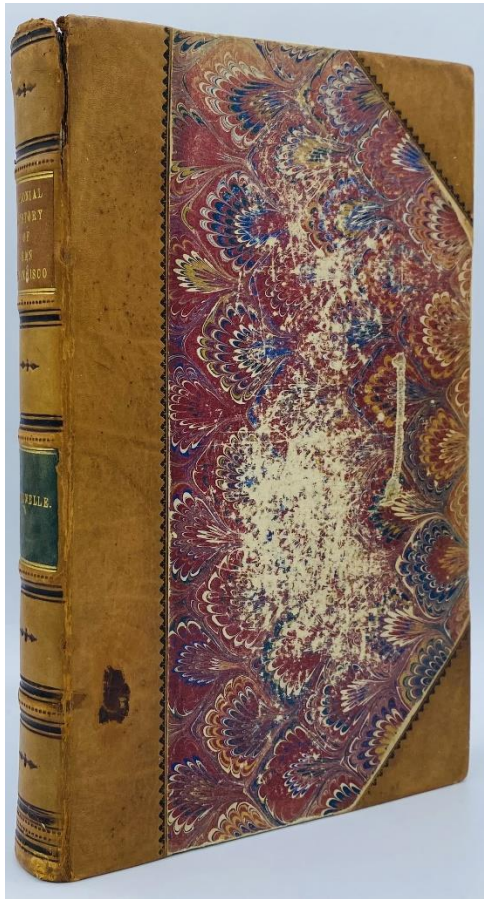

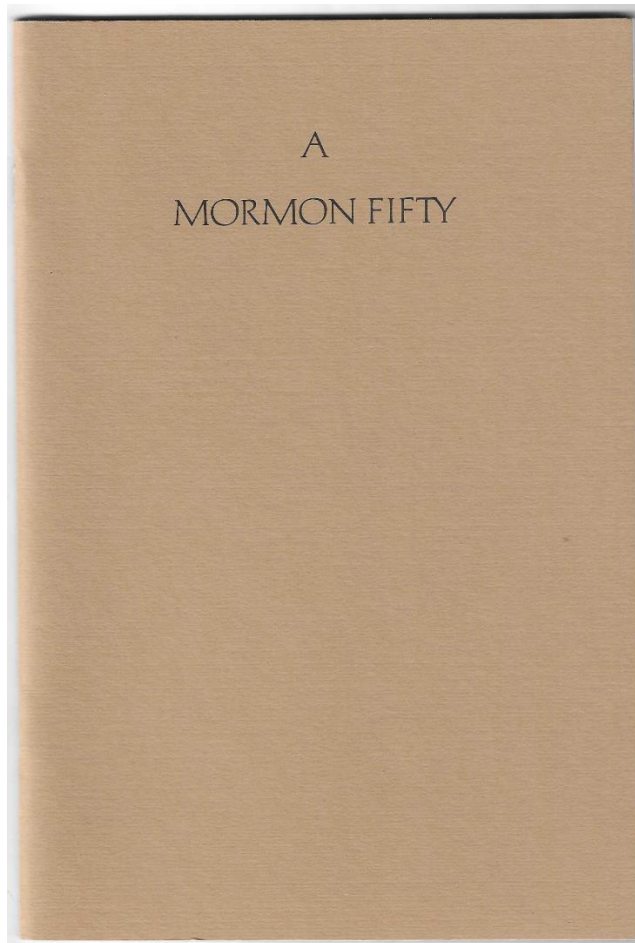

To prove the legal existence of the Pueblo the attorney for San Francisco submitted his brief this complete history of the city, with supporting data from the archives and other contemporary sources. But beyond this, each of these books contributed to the ideological development of the LDS Church, marked an important historical event, or affected history itself." - from the introduction
