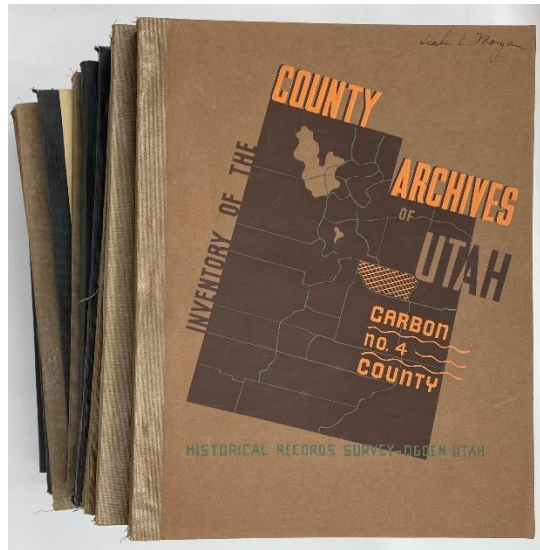
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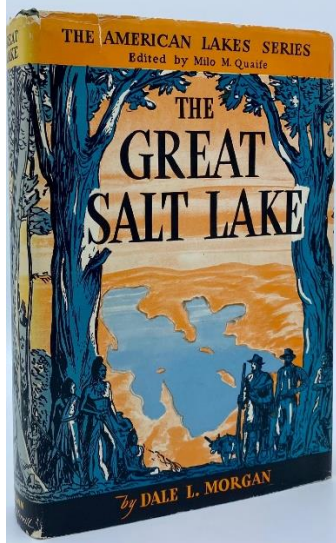

*Dale Morgan's first job was with the Utah Works Progress Administration (WPA). He wrote introductory historical essays for the Historical Records Department, and his talents were soon acknowledged. The WPA published Morgan's first monograph in 1940. In the same year, the Utah Historical Quarterly published his *The State of Deseret*. He was soon transferred to the writer's program of the WPA, where he edited and did most of the writing for *Utah, A Guide to the State*, published in 1941.*

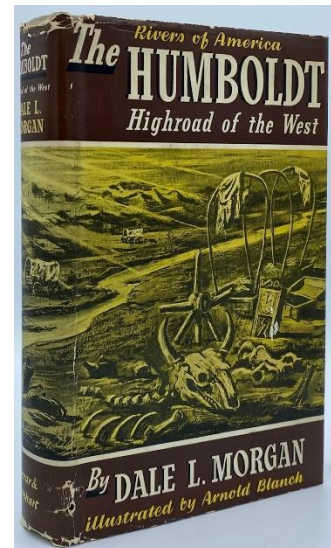
Signed on a special tipped-in sheet that is attached to front flyleaf. Bobbs-Merrill's series on American lakes was sponsored as an attempt to recapture a market share from Farrar & Rinehart's widely successful Rivers of America Series. Great Salt Lake dealt more with the historical context of the lake than the body of water itself, describing the epochal history of the lake itself, early exploration and mapping, the settlements of Salt Lake City, tourism and recreation, and the advent of railroads beside and across the lake. Besides his incomplete history of the Mormons, this work contains the only published example of Morgan's historical treatment of his religious culture. Saunders 19.

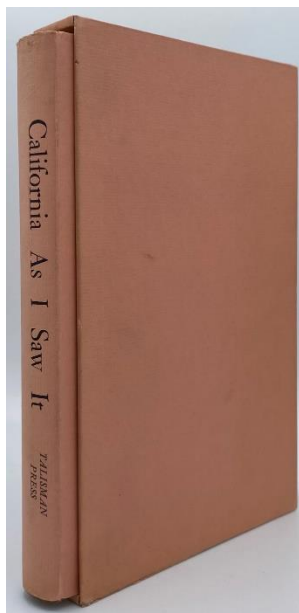

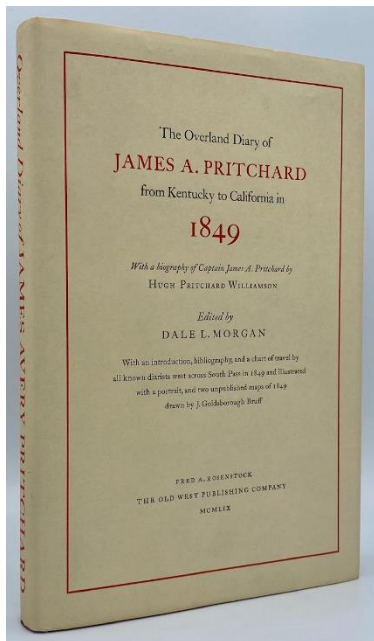
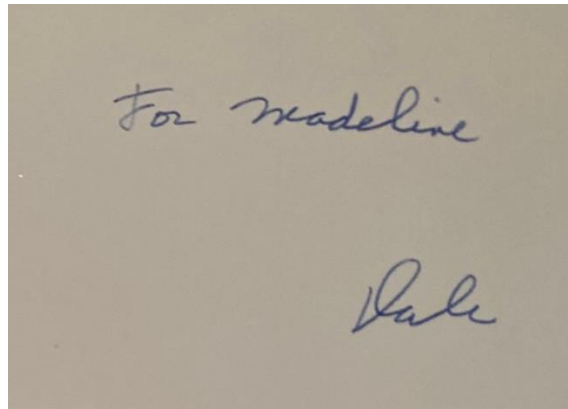

This is one of 12 special unnumbered copies that have a slipcase and are signed by Morgan on the half-title. These were produced for the publisher and to the best of our knowledge not offered for sale. Nearly the first third of the book is Morgan's biographical essay of the author and a bibliographic recounting of similar publications. McCollum's (typically abbreviated as M'Collum) work is as much a travel guide for those intending to go west via Panama as it is a narrative of his experiences in the West. 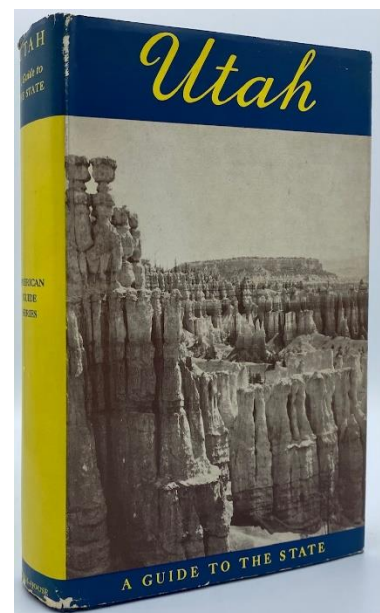

His attention to detail is manifest throughout the copious notes, but is best shown by the table at the conclusion comparing the travel schedules of every known diarist on the South Pass route in 1849. Dear Mr. Martineau, the copy of my book at Dawson's happens to be one of the limited editions (in green cloth) especially

autographed before publication. I have re-autographed or further signed it for you now. The portrait is one Dawson's had made especially to be in these copies. Dale L. Morgan."

Morgan's most famous work was a direct result of the time spent in libraries while working for the OPA. Morgan wrote this classic on a badly needed advance from Bobbs-Merrill after Farrar and Rinehart dropped the publication contract for his history of the Mormons and the Guggenheim Foundation failed to renew his fellowship for writing. 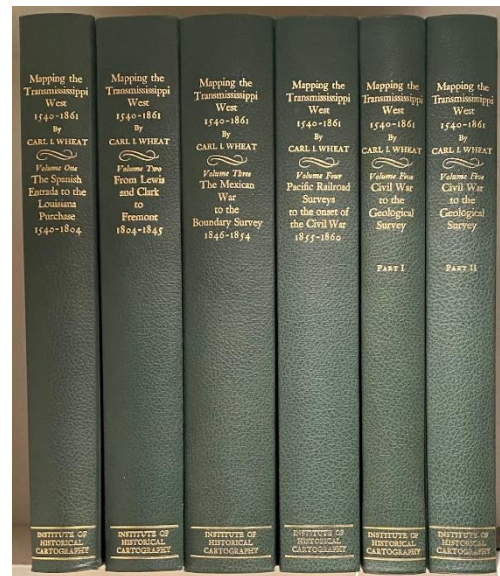

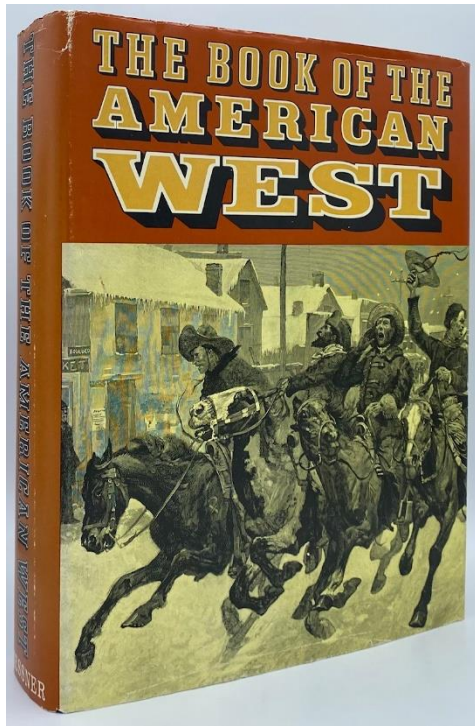

This five volume work describes the maps of Western America from the earliest cartographic conjectures to Spanish explorations of the fifteenth century, through early exploration and overland travel up to the beginnings of the great surveys and the Civil War. Morgan's contribution to this classic work was greater than is generally recognized. From the forewords to the individual volumes it seems that Morgan functioned as an unofficial editor and research fellow. Wheat gratefully acknowledged his liberal contributions of information, footnotes, and editorial work. Of the text itself, chapter 36 on Mormon maps in the fourth volume, and all of volume five (two books) was Morgan's work. Additionally, because Wheat was victimized by several strokes, about one-half of the second volume and ninety percent of the third is apocryphally attributed to Morgan's authorship, though he claimed only the complete volume five on his own bibliography in the Morgan Papers. 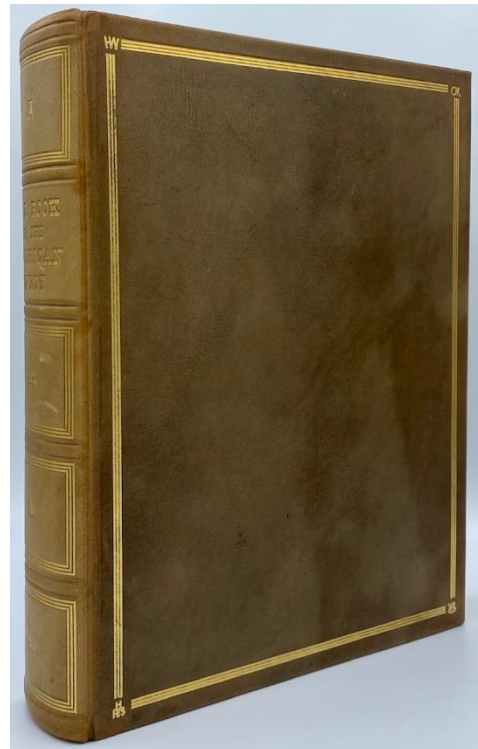

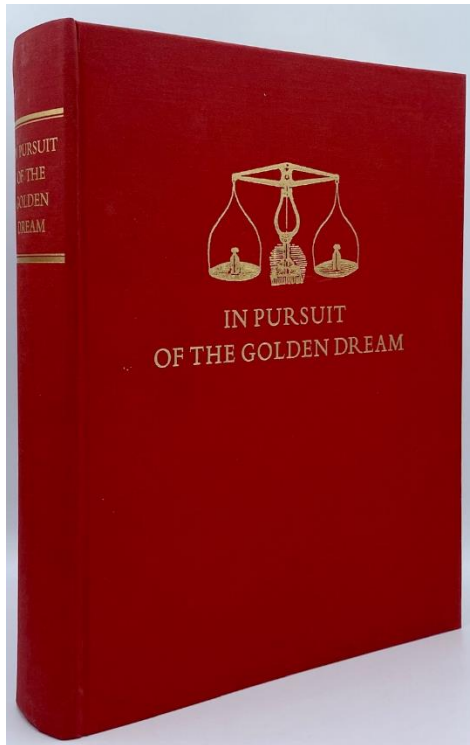

In addition to reprinting Gardiner's work, Morgan compiled a substantial introduction consisting of a bibliographic essay on the northern mines and correspondence concerning the original publication of the reminiscences. Gardiner rounded the Horn in 1849. The narrative is pleasantly readable with the color of mining life and surroundings painted on the business-

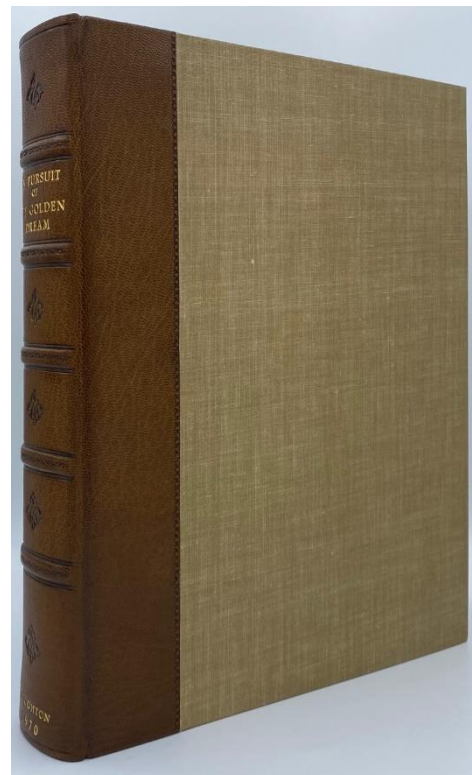

This book deals with his early life in the fur trade, his important role in the overland emigration to California in 1844-1845, his subsequent contribution as one of the more important trailblazers and guides, his part in the relief of the Donner Party, and his activities along the American River after the discovery of gold at Sutter's Mill in 1848.

Kelly originally authored and privately published this book in 1936. In a letter several years later, now in the Charles Kelly Papers at the

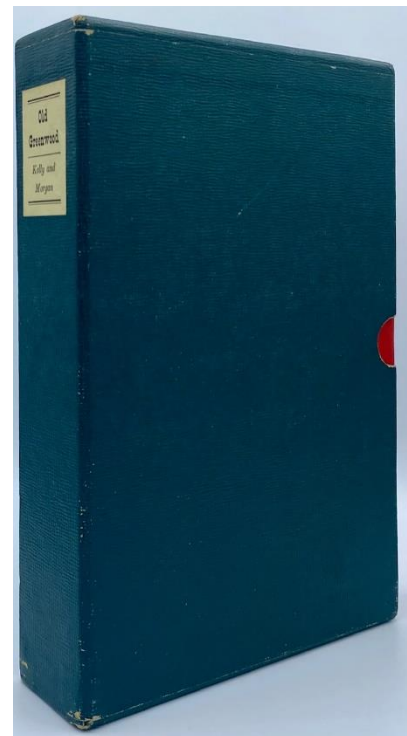

The kernel for this monumental work was Dale's bibliography assembled before 1949. Planted during the late 1930s as Morgan worked on the WPA bibliography of religion in Utah, during his five year stint in Washington, D.C., he added this project to his priority list while sifting through the holdings of the Library of Congress and other eastern institutions. Working on his first Guggenheim Fellowship, Morgan was able to visit libraries of Mormon sects across the nation and publish three bibliographies in the Western Humanities Review. When the history of

Mormonism for which it was compiled was never completed, the manuscript was given to the Utah State Historical Society, and over the years additions were made by he and others. Towards the end of his life Dale assisted with editing and expanded listing; the book was ultimately published as a cooperative effort of several institutions. Though Morgan did not live to see the fruition of his labor on this work, his contribution has assumed a place at the foundation of his study of Mormonism.
