
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

This work is regarded Abbey's most famous and influential novel, that follows the deeds and adventures of Doc, Hayduke, Bonnie, and Seldom Seen, as they protest the industrialization and destruction of the southwest through means of sabotage and "monkeywrenching." Because of this work, the term 'monkeywrench' has come to mean, besides sabotage and damage to machines, any sabotage, activism, lawmaking, or lawbreaking to preserve wilderness, wild spaces and ecosystems. Edward Abbey (1927-1989) was a celebrated author, essayist, conservationist, noted pain-in-the-ass, and in many ways the father (or at the very least, uncle) of the modern environmental movements. 



3- Bierstadt, Charles. **Old and New Tabernacle. Salt Lake City, Utah.** Niagara Falls, NY: C. Bierstadt, Photographer, (c.1867). Albumen stereoview [8 cm x 15 cm] on an orange Bierstadt mount [9 cm x 17.5 cm] Corners of mount rubbed. Nice contrasts.

View of the Temple Block from the north that shows the recently completed Tabernacle and the soon to be demolished, original Tabernacle. The Salt Lake Tabernacle took three years to construct (1864-1867) and was later described by Frank Lloyd Wright as "one of the architectural masterpieces of the country and perhaps the world." Charles Bierstadt (1819-1903) was a successful stereoview photographer from New Bedford, MA, who with his brother Edward operated a studio in Niagara Falls, New York. Charles traveled throughout the American West in the 1870s and 1880s and was the younger brother of the renowned painter, Albert.



Illustrated guide describing the rites and ceremonies of Free Masonry, similar to William Morgan's Freemasonry Exposed. Jeremy Ladd Cross was an iconic and influential Masonic lecturer known for his leadership in Masonic lodges in New Hampshire at the end of the 18th-century. His best book was True Masonic Chart, a book of illustrated symbolic emblems which was used to aid in rituals and ceremonies. His lectures and Masonic Chart were both known to be influential within Masonic circles for nearly a century.

Image of Emigration Canyon's Pinecrest Inn that was built as a destination by the Emigration Canyon Railroad. The Emigration Canyon Railroad was incorporated in 1907. Within a year the 14-mile line was in operation. Its city terminus and yards were located near the western end of the present University of Utah stadium parking lot. Its route passed by Mount Olivet Cemetery, Sunnyside Avenue, the Wagner Brewery near the mouth of the canyon, and up what is now Highway U-65 to the Killyon's Canyon turnoff, with a spur to the quarries. The ECCR operated until 1907.

Description of a meeting that took place in support of polygamy at the Salt Lake Theatre by plural wives. Includes statements from Eliza R. Snow, Phoebe Woodruff, Mary Silver, Zina D. Young, Annie Wells, Emmeline B. Wells, Hannah King, Margaret T. Smoot, Romania B. Pratt, and others.

"The chairman, Miss Snow, stated the object of the meeting, and made some appropriate and touching remarks. Mrs. Bathsheba W. Smith read an address. Mrs. Zina D. Young delivered an eloquent extemporaneous speech in which, like her predecessor, she bore a strong testimony to the truth, and to her firm belief in its principles, especially that of Celestial Marriage. She was followed by Mrs. Hannah T. King, who read a well written article, claiming for herself and her sisters the right to religious liberty. Mrs. Margaret T. Smoot then bore her testimony to the truth of her religion, and her respect for the principle of plural marriage. She was followed by Dr. Romania B. Pratt. 

An excellent resource for anyone researching utopian agricultural communities. Small run of newsletters from the Order of Aaron. This is the official periodical for the Order of Aaron, a utopian community that is based in Eskdale, which is at the southern end of the Snake Valley near the Utah border with Nevada. Originally considered an LDS schismatic group, due to the founder, Maurice Glendenning's, previous association with the Mormon Church. Glendenning was excommunicated from the LDS Church in 1945, after the founding of the House of Aaron. "Come and share, through our newsletter, our joy and assurance that God is at our helm and that He will yet lead His people into the daily offerings of our lives in service to Him as Levites will be acceptable before Him."



Illustrated guide for the perspective rider of the D&RG, which was founded by the visionary General William Palmer in 1870 as the nation's first narrow-gauge railroad, Colorado's 'Baby Road' became a vital link in the national transportation system. The D&RGW went through the Rockies - not around them - developing resources, fighting corporate wars, and helping build communities.

"This little book is intended to give the tourist information, and it does not aspire to vivid descriptions or the graces of fine writing. It will endeavor to tell the traveler what to see, and how to see it, and to give him concisely as possible exactly the information he would naturally desire." - p.[2]

Clarence King, the man Henry Adams called "the best and brightest of his generation," worked with the California Geological Survey from 1863 until 1867, when he became the head of the Fortieth Parallel Survey. For the better part of a decade, he worked among the peaks of the high Sierra, pioneering as a surveyor and mountain climber. 

Wild West Show poster that advertises a reenactment of the Mountain Meadows Massacre with a description that runs several paragraphs. Hand stamp at the foot for the show at Greenfield, Mass. Tuesday July 5 [1910]. We are unable to locate another example of this in any institution, we are unable to locate any other being offered for sale. Rare. Jones Brothers Buffalo Ranch Wild West Show was formed out of the old Cole Brothers touring show, and operated for a single season in 1910, before being sold and renamed the 'Kit Carson Buffalo Ranch Wild West Show.'

"Interest in Wild West shows declined with the advent of motion pictures. Even so, the Mountain Meadows Massacre endured as a popular part of these shows at least as late as 1914. ." - Melvin Bashore 'The Bloodiest Drama Perpetrated on American Soil: Staging the Mountain Meadows Massacre for Entertainment'



This work was part of a larger effort by the Church to gain statehood, and the railroads to maximize passenger receipts in and through the Great Basin, to soften the country's attitude towards Utah and the Mormon Church. Well-made, heavy-duty book ends that depict a hooded and robed figure sitting on a book, while leaning against an opened book. These bookends were made by the architect of the Mesa Temple. Arthur Price (1874-1971) was a British-born architect, who trained as a draftsman before converting to the LDS Church in 1901. In 1923 he relocated to Mesa to oversee the construction of the Temple, a position he held until the dedication in 1927. Price also worked on the Oakland, Ogden, and Provo Temples. Unique.



Roland W. Reed (1864-1934) was a photographer working in the American west, who was largely self-funded in his effort to document the vanishing indigenous peoples he encountered and sought out. Many of his images were staged to offer romanticized depictions of these people as he wanted to see them. Reed lived with and photographed the Ojibwe in Minnesota; the Blackfeet, Piegan, Flathead, Cheyenne, and Blood in northern Montana and southern Canada; and the Navajo and Hopi in Arizona. He had begun work on the publication of his collection with the title 'Reed's Photographic Art Studies of the North American Indian' at the time of his accidental death.

"The ten pictures described give a general coverage of our main Indian groups. This set has been purchased by many Teachers' Colleges for use in their Training Schools, and hundreds of schools have secured sets for use in their grades, art classes, and libraries. The pictures are photogravure reproductions of Mr. Reed's photographs on heavy paper." from one of the prospecti.




16- Roberts, Brigham Henry. Edited by John W. Welch. **The Truth, The Way, The Life, An Elementary Treatise on Theology**. Provo: BYU Studies, 1994. First Edition. 607pp. Octavo [23.5 cm] Green cloth with the title gilt stamped on the backstrip. Near fine.

This is Roberts' Magnum Opus published more than six decades after its completion. "B.H. Roberts considered 'The Truth, The Way, The Life' to be the most important work he had written. While people may differ with him on that judgment, this ambitious treatise deserves to be published. True, many of the ideas discussed by Roberts are now outdated, many have radically changed, and many new concepts have arisen in the sixty-six years since this work was written - but still this effort shows a great mind grappling with great issues." - Leonard Arrington.

Brigham H. Roberts (1857-1933) was one of the seven presidents of the First Council of the Seventy. A voluminous writer, he is perhaps best known for his outstanding A Comprehensive History of the Church, a major landmark in LDS historical writing from which this selection has been gleaned. Born in England, he was baptized in Utah in 1867, following his emigration. He graduated from the University of Deseret in 1878, taught school, and gradually drifted into journalism. He filled missions in Tennessee (1880-82), in the southern states (1883-86), and in England (1886-88). In 1888 he was called to the First Council of the Seventy; in 1889 he spent four months in prison for "unlawful cohabitation." Elected to the U.S. House of Representatives, Roberts was denied his seat because of his polygamist beliefs. His histories and biographies and treatises remain among the important works of Mormon literature.



The railroad arrived in 1873, more gold and silver was discovered and the boom was on. A unique and vast mountain park system was preserved for rest and relaxation and people came from all over to enjoy Boulder's beautiful wilderness and moderate climate. Today Boulder is a thriving city for 100,000 residents. Many high tech industries have found a home here along with a great intellectual community."



This poster was produced by the Utah Parks Company, which was a subsidiary of the Union Pacific, and offered guided loop tours to Cedar Breaks, Bryce Canyon, Zion and the North Rim of the Grand Canyon. Bryce Canyon was made a National Park by an act of Congress in 1928, and is known the world over for its red rock hoodoos and exceptional hikes (Fairyland, Wall Street, Navajo Loop, Queen's Road, etc.). The park's main road leads past the expansive Bryce Amphitheater, a hoodoo filled wonderland.



This is the first publication from the Zamorano Club that offers a brief history of the founding of the Club and lists officers and members. The Zamorano Club is a bibliophilic society based in Los Angeles, and it is the oldest organization of its type in Southern California. Founded on January 25, 1928, it is named for Agustín V. Zamorano who brought the first printing press to California.

The Edmunds Act was part of a string of bills and laws passed by the federal government outlawing polygamy, that would reach an apex with the Edmund Tucker act that was passed in 1887.
