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



Work opens with a four-page description of the Al Malaikah's Los Angeles Temple and their representatives. The Al Malaikah Temple is home to world famous Shrine Auditorium. This is followed by a seven-page introduction touting the area's beauty, modernization, schools, and economic opportunities. This is followed by the captioned views.

"Everyone who really knows Southern California knows that is a remarkable situation. Important travel narrative with much on California before the American conquest, Beechey arrived in San Francisco on November 7, 1826. He remained about a month in California, returning in 1827 for another month's stay. He gives a description of San Francisco harbor and tells of the sad state of affairs of both mission and presidio. 

The author of this work was an attaché to the French embassy in Mexico City. he arrived in Monterey in May, 1841, remaining about five months. De Mofras work contains very little of his personal narrative. He aimed to give a complete description of the country, its history and present condition. This edition was limited to 250, numbered copies that are signed by the publisher. British merchant Alexander Forbes wrote the first book published in English relating exclusively to California. His narrative, as observed by Hubert Howe Bancroft, was not so much history as "a presentation by an intelligent man of business of the country's actual condition, capabilities, institutions, and prospects." His book, more than any other, made California known to the English-speaking world and spurred on both European and American interest in controlling this remote Mexican outpost. Zamorano Eighty: 38. 



William H. Hall (1846-1934) was California's State Engineer when he authored these volumes. The first part concerns irrigation legislation in France, Italy, and Spain. The second part concerns the Southern California counties of Los Angeles, San Bernardino, and San Diego. This is the earliest overall survey of California's hydrological system. With water in the west, there is always controversy, and this work was not immune, especially his recommendation for more government control over the development of the state's water resources. The legislature became his enemy, and in 1888 refused to provide funding for a planned third volume in this series, that was intended to cover the San Joaquin Valley. He resigned, his office was abolished, and the bulk of his data lay unpublished for decades. Zamorano Select 38.









This work provides an historical and cultural background for the prewar Japanese in California and discusses how all 100,000 of them - children, women, and men - lost their civil rights because it was feared they might be spies or show affinity for a dreaded Japanese occupation. Not long after the attack on Pearl Harbor, they were uprooted from their homes and sent under military guard to various camps in inland America. Zamorano Select 74.

This work was originally released as 'Life Among the Modocs' [1873]. This work is based on Miller's years among the mining towns and Indian camps of northernmost California during the tumultuous 1850s. Miller attempted to form an Indian republic among the Pit River Indians, the Klamaths, Shastas, and Modocs.

'Joaquin' [Cincinnatus Heine] Miller (1837-1913) traveled to the California gold fields in 1854 at the age of 17. During his time in California he tried his hand at a variety of professions (mining camp cook, a lawyer and a judge, a newspaper writer, a conservationist, and a Pony Express rider.) His true love was writing and he proclaimed himself 'The Poet of the Sierras' and 'The Byron of the Rockies.' At the urging of Ina D. Coolbrith, he changed his name to Joaquin Miller sometime around 1870. Howes M608.



Nice collection of panorama photographs of the California town of Coalinga and the oil field that surrounds it, with bird's eye views of town, the oil fields, and drilling equipment. Located on the western edge of the San Joaquin Valley, Coalinga was founded in the late 19 century, after a large deposit of coal was found in the area. Soon after it was laid out by Southern Pacific Railroad engineers in 1891, and used as a coaling station (thus the name). When the Silver Tip Well was discovered in 1910, it was the largest oil find in the state at the time. Coalinga's oil field is now the eighth-largest oil field in California, with reserves totaling approximately 58 million barrels. Images of all views available.







The second feature is Morian's Swiss Canine Pantomime company, which scored a sensation at the Berlin Winter Garden. This company of 40 canine actors offers a pantomime called 'The Spoiled Honeymoon.' Third among the new-comers will be Phasma, the Goddess of Light, an elaborate and dancing sensation." - Los Angeles Evening Post (01/24/1914).



This was the first attempt at a history of California in the first half of the 18th century. This work was compiled and edited by Father Andres Marcos Burriel, on Venegas' 1739 manuscript, and also incorporating information from other contemporary sources. Cowan states "Other than Cabrera, Burriel was the first writer whose sound sense allowed him to reject the apocryphal voyages as unworthy of credit, to restrict northern geography to actual discoveries, and to correctly define in print the peninsula and the regions of the Colorado and Gila as far as known." This edition was printed in a limitation of 400 signed and numbered copies, this is number 111. Illustrated with 88 full-page color plates. The Wasp was founded as a weekly satire magazine in San Francisco in 1876 by the Bohemian expatriate Francis Korbel and his two brothers. The Korbels developed a successful San Francisco business manufacturing redwood cigar box that required lithographic labels, which they also produced. Hence, shortly after it began publication, The Wasp began to feature colored political cartoons. By the spring of 1877, it had developed its hallmark folio-size format with a pair of

full-page cartoons on the front and rear covers and a double-page graphic as a centerfold. It appears to have pioneered the mass production of large-scale colored cartoons in the United States.
