
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

Attractive map of America, Mexico and southern Canada shortly after Mexican independence with a legend at the lower left listing the 19 Mexican states. Waterways and bodies of water are located and many western tribes are located as well. The Great Salt Lake and Utah Lake are shown but unnamed. The Great Basin is labeled 'Unbekantes Land' [Unknown Land]. Not in Wheat. Not in Moffat. Rare.

Map showing the claims at the top of Salt Lake's Cottonwood Canyons. Reverse prints a prospectus and glowing descriptions of some of the claims.

"We believe that conditions are ripe for a big up-swing on the Salt Lake Exchange that will carry all of the Alta-Cottonwoods to much higher levels, with sensational advances in Alta Con., Wasatch, Emma, and one or two others. This is buyin time, and we urge our clients to use the wire and take advantage of the great opportunity offered by the entire Alta-Cottonwoods list." - from prospectus.






3- Becker, F. Otto. **Custer's Last Hight**. St. Louis, MO: Anheuser Busch, Inc., (c.1952). This has not been examined out of the frame. 'O. Becker' at the lower right corner. Printed by Milwaukee Lithographic & Engraving Company.

Custer's Last Fight is considered one the most popular lithographs of the late 19th and 20th Centuries, and was displayed in countless saloons, dining establishments, and barber shops. This print was used as an advertising promotion for Anheuser Busch. This work is based on the Cassilly Adams painting which in turn was inspired by the narrative of the battle by Crow Scout, Curley, along with the John Mulvany 1881 painting Custer's Last Fight. This image depicts the battle between Custer's troops and Native American warriors at Little Big Horn. Custer is featured at center waving a saber

and dressed in a fringed buckskin. The remaining cavalry officers, except for Custer's brother Tom, are dressed in military uniform. The Native Americans are armed with scalping knives, tomahawks, clubs, spears, and rifles, with the dead in foreground.

Inscribed by the author on the copyright page. Oliver Hyer Budge (1872-1965) was a longtime civic and ecclesiastical leader in Cache Valley and northern Utah. He was a dentist by training and served as President of the German and Austrian Mission in the early 1930s, during Adolph Hitler's rise to power. This self-published work is rare.


5-Burr, David H. Map Showing the Extent of Surveys in the Territory of Utah, 1856.

Philadelphia: P.S. Duval & Son Lith., 1856. Map [82 cm x 39 cm] / [32.5" x 15.5"] on a single sheet [88 cm x 43 cm] / [34.5" x 17"] Folds as issued. Better than very good with some minor damage to the left edge. Beautifully hand-tinted.

Early Utah Territorial map that shows the Great Salt Lake drainage, from Nephi to Malad, and Tuilla [Tooele] to the Wasatch Front. The valleys are all named as well as most of the settlements, with a few spelling variations or different names altogether, including 'Willow Creek' [Draper]; 'Union Fort' [Midvale]; 'Summit Creek' [Santaquin] and 'Mountainville' [Alpine].

This map was one of the last undertaken by the noted cartographer, David H. Burr, who faced constant harassment and sabotage from the Mormon locals while working on this. Published as part of the 34th Congress, 3rd Session Ex. Document Number 5. Moffat 44.







Attractive map that is colored by counties and locates Filmore City as the capitol of Utah Territory and has the Great Basin identified as Fremont Basin. Shows the enlarged territorial borders of Utah, that stretches from the Sierra Nevada to the Rocky Mountains. Shows the Gadsden Treaty line of 1854. This is the first map to show counties in Utah including Desert County (west of GSL). Locates the old Spanish Trail, Oregon Trail, and Fremont's routes. Moffat: 29. Wheat: 813.

The album is interspersed throughout with 47 contemporary post cards, 11 are RPPCs. A handful of larger photographs appear throughout.

An excellent vernacular photography album that nicely documents recreating in Utah by a group of hunters, fishers, hikers, and adventurers. Views of the Wasatch foothills, (Grandeur, Parley's, Willow Creek, Big Cottonwood, Little Cottonwood, Lamb's), Provo Canyon and River, Bryce Canyon, Zion Canyon, Salt Flats, Dry Lake, Lake Tahoe, Redwoods, Cedar Valley, Skull Valley, Promontory, Ogden Canyon, Iosepa, Ensign Peak, Strawberry River, Wolf Creek, Fish Lake, and other locales. Some nice views of the Salt Lake Temple and Sugarhouse street scenes. Nicely identified and dated. This is the finest such album that we've handled. This album appears to have been compiled by Charles C. Eidler of Salt Lake City.


Nice map of the west that shows the enlarged territorial borders of Utah, that stretches from the Sierra Nevada to the Rocky Mountains. Salt Lake City is located and is named 'New Jerusalem.' Not in Moffat. Scarce.

Early Americas map from the renowned Nuremberg family of cartographers. California is shown as a peninsula and the Northwest Passage is also shown. Attractive cartouche at the lower left. Johann Baptist Homann was a cartographer and publisher; he founded a printing press in 1702, which was the origin of the publishing house 'Homann Heirs'. After his death his son J.C.Homann continued the business, and after his death in 1730 the company was continued under the name 'Homann Heirs'.





Promotional invitation for a lecture with magic lantern slides from longtime Great Northern representative Lawrence D. Kitchell, that was given in Topeka, Kansas. "Three thousand persons, the largest crowd that has greeted Lawrence Kitchell on his present tour, attended the travelogue at the auditorium last night, given under the auspices of the Knights and Ladies of Security. Yesterday afternoon 500 school children thoroughly enjoyed the dances of the Black Foot Indians and the wonderful scenery of Glacier National Park which was shown upon the screen and explained by Mr. Kitchell." - Topeka Daily Capital (05/12/1914).





A few short, closed tears at the head in the margin (does not affect map).

Rare map, that locates the shortly lived 'State of Deseret' which Brigham Young proposed in the spring of 1849. This provisional state was never recognized by the United States government, but was still located by a handful of European map makers, who wanted to provide in their mind, the most accurate map and to put it in the hands of the public at large, but specifically those who wanted to take to the Mormon, Oregon & California trails and settle in the then largely uninhabited western U.S. The dream of the State of Deseret ended in the fall of 1850, with the establishment of the Territory of Utah. Salt Lake City is located at its present location and named 'Mormonfort. Not in Moffat. Not in Wheat.


Major and important western map. This is the first map to include reference to the Golden Gate at the entrance of San Francisco Bay and the first to locate the gold fields 'El Dorado' or Gold Region. This map is also the first to locate the Humboldt River, that was given its name by this map. The 'Great Basin' was also named by this map. The 'Mormon Settlements' are located to the east of the Great Salt Lake. This is the rarer and smaller version, that excludes the Missouri and Oregon Territories, and only shows California and the Great Basin portion of 1848, that Fremont issued as a separate map. This is one of the only detailed reports to come out of Fremont's ill-fated Third Expedition. Wheat: 559 Wheat, Gold Region: 41. Moffatt 17.

Utah based artist, Mark Knudsen, was hired to hand-tint this illustration, that was intended to be printed in the corresponding calendar of the tenth-anniversary edition of the Monkey Wrench Gang, that was published by Ken Sanders' Dream Garden Press. When R. Crumb was presented this for his feedback, he was unhappy with the coloring. This illustration faces page 193.

The tenth anniversary edition of the Monkey Wrench Gang contained illustrations throughout by the legendary illustrator, R[obert] Crumb. Robert Crumb (American b. 1943) is an American cartoonist and musician, who is well-known for influential works and contributions to the underground comix movement in the 1960s. Crumb is known for his quirky artwork coupled with idiosyncratic dialogue.

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


15- Robert C. Euler and Henry F. Dobyns (series editors). **Indian Tribal Series**. Phoenix, AZ: [Imperial Lithographers], 1970-76. 40 volume set with 40 corresponding silver medals. Octavos [23 cm] Blue wrappers with the title silver stamped on the backstrip. Blind stamped image on the cover of each matches one of the sides of the corresponding coin. All volumes very good or better, some show minor sunning to backstrips. The medals were minted by Franklin Mint and are housed in book boxes that match the printed volumes. Each silver medal weighs a troy ounce and has specially commissioned artwork for the front and the official Tribal Seal on the reverse. This set is complete.

Tribes covered (in publishing order): Havasupai - Hopi - Apache - Sioux - Paiute - Navajo - Crow - Osage -Papago - Yakima - Mescalero - Choctaw - Creek - Seminole - Cherokee - Kalispel - Chickasaw - Three Affiliated Tribes (Mandan, Arikara, and Hidatsa) - Ponca - Kaw - Kickapoo - Chippewa - Kenaitze -Chitimacha - Quapaw - Narragansett - Seneca - Hualapai - Ottawa - Coushatta - Pawnee - Modoc -Potawatomi - Eskimo - Wichita.

Each volume focuses on a particular tribe and were compiled with the tribe's cooperation and collaboration with each signed by a tribal chairman or leader on the limitation page. The participating tribes had some editorial control and signed off on the designs used for the medals (one side of each coin is the corresponding tribe's seal). The editors were leading academics and world-renowned anthropologists who both focused on indigenous peoples of the Americas. This series was by subscription and is rare complete, and with the tribal medals.








Forty-six poems from Floyd Weston Stafford (1886-1976) who lived with cerebral palsy, who wrote this work using only his big toe, on a specially designed typewriter from the International Business Machine [IBM] Corporation that had a special shifting lever to facilitate his toe typing. We locate only three institutional holdings. Rare

Inset map at lower left labeled "Nordostl Theil Verein Staaten" [Northeast part of the United States] that shows the Eastern Seaboard, from North Carolina to Maine. Canada is labeled "Hudsons Bay Lander." Texas is shown and labeled, but as part of Mexico. Plate XIX [19] from first Swedish edition of the Stieler school atlas based on the first 1821 German edition. The Great Salt Lake ["Timapnogos"] and Utah Lake ["Tegigo"] are both shown with an unnamed Buenaventura River flowing from Utah Lake to Monterey. Rare. Not in Moffat. Not in Wheat.







18- Vancouver, George. Voyage of Discovery to the Pacific Ocean, and Round the World; In which the Coast of Northwest America has been carefully examined and accurately surveyed. Complete with all 18 tipped-in plates.

George Vancouver (1757-1798) was a junior officer and the second and third voyages of Cook, and was placed in charge of an expedition to the Northwest Coast to survey the area and determine the English Crown's rights under the Nootka Sound Convention of 1790. Vancouver's ships reached the Pacific Northwest in 1792, and then spent the following two years surveying the coastline. Vancouver's expedition produced the most accurate maps up to that point and for decades following. Vancouver died before the publication of



Charming pictorial map that locates some of the distinctive and scenic places in Utah and the cultures and people who inhabit this excellent place.

"Because the lofty Wasatch Range rises sheer above northern Utah, forming the southern spur of the Rockies, Utah is classed as one of the Rocky Mountain states. However, western Utah is a part of the Great Basin and the southern part of the State verges off into the Southwestern Desert region. Utah is a State of infinite variety, famous for its rainbow-colored canyons, cliffs and natural bridges, and Great Salt Lake. It is renowned likewise as the Mormon State. It was founded, and for a time governed by the Mormon Church." - Frank J. Taylor.
