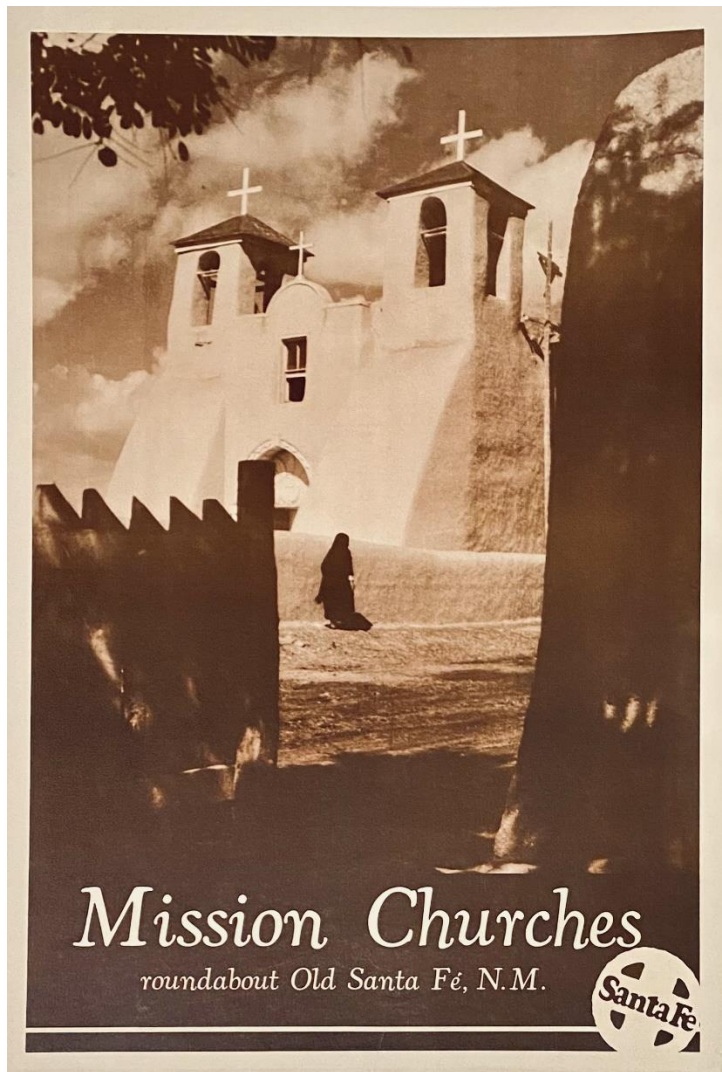
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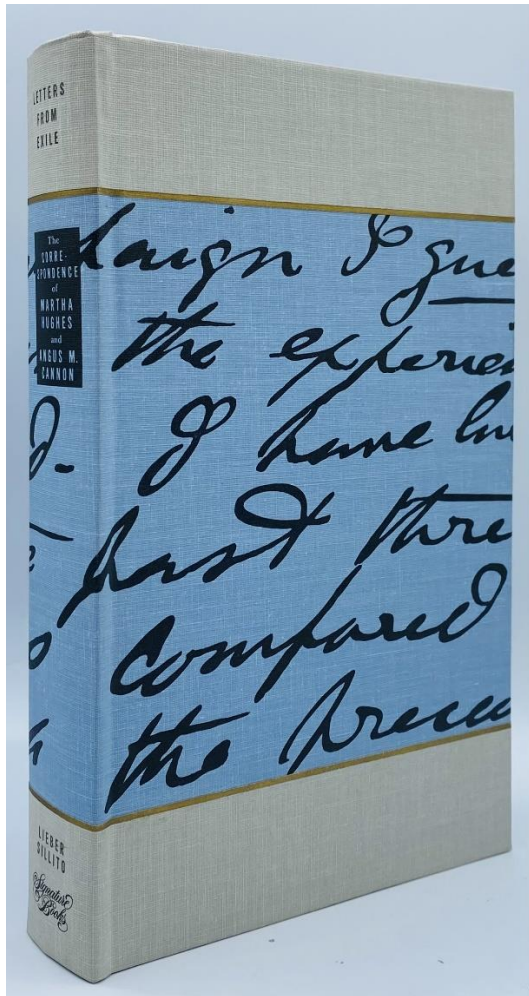

Nice Santa Fe Railway poster featuring an image of San Francisco de Assisi Mission in Rancho de Taos in northern New Mexico. At its height the Atchison, Topeka and Santa Fe Railway Company, 'The Santa Fe', was one of the largest rail operators in the United States. Chartered in Kansas as the Atchison and Topeka Railroad Company in 1859, it had sizable influence on the settlement of the southwestern United States in the late 19th century. It was renamed the Atchison, Topeka and Santa Fe Railroad in 1863 and acquired its modern name in 1895. When the Santa Fe linked up with the Southern Pacific it created the second transcontinental railroad. By the time it was acquired by the Burlington Northern railroad in 1996, the Santa Fe Railway covered 12 states

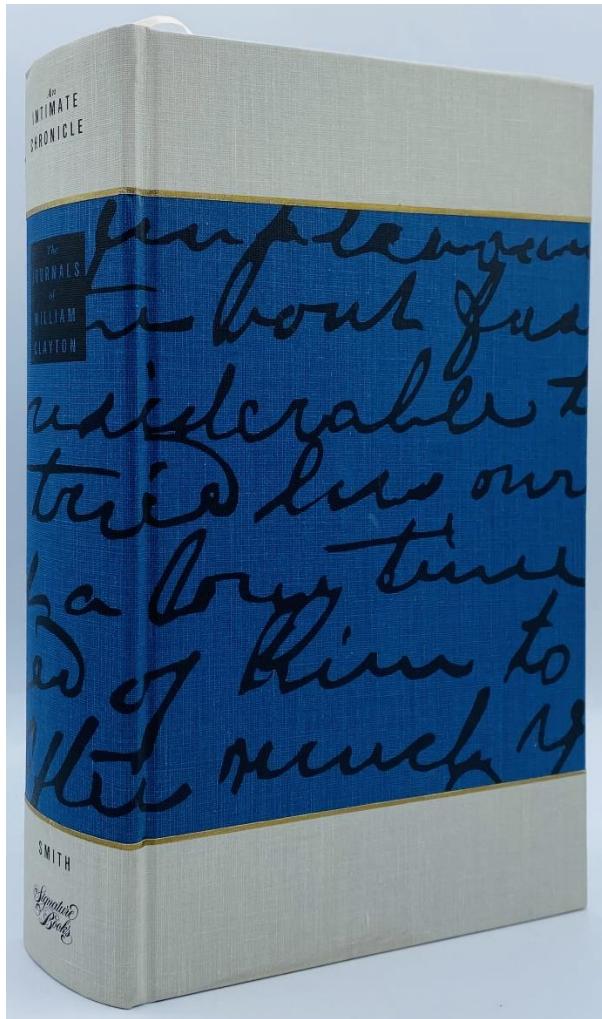

This edition was limited to 500 numbered copies. Twenty-three years her husband's junior, Martha Hughes Cannon was not the youngest wife of Angus M., a ranking church official. Nor was she a backwoods girl with few options. Mattie was a University of Michigan-trained physician, an outspoken suffragist, and the first female state senator in American history. However, rather than testify against her husband in federal court, she fled with her baby to England in 1886. The couple's correspondence is rich in detail regarding life in Utah on the underground just prior to polygamy's abolition.

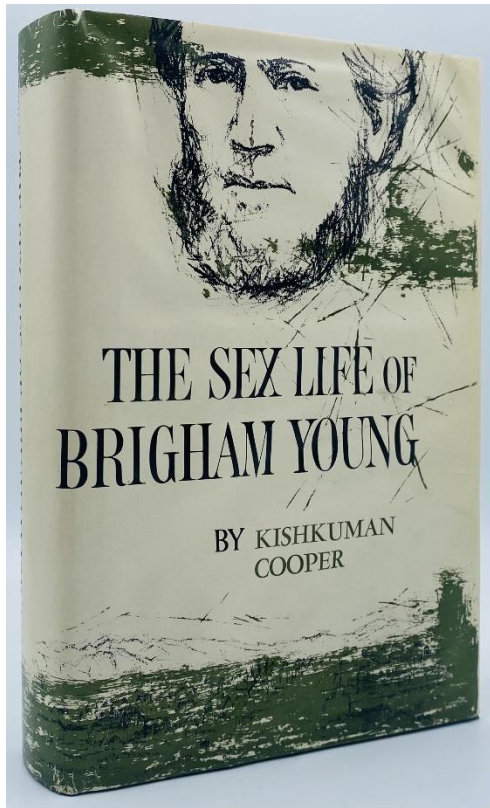

This edition was limited to 500 copies. William Clayton (1814-1879) is best remembered today for his hymns, especially "Come, Come Ye Saints." But as one of the earliest Latter-day Saint scribes, he made intellectual as well as artistic contributions to his church, and his records have been silently incorporated into official Mormon scripture and history. Of equal significance are his personal impressions of day-to-day activities, which describe a social and religious world largely unfamiliar to modern readers.

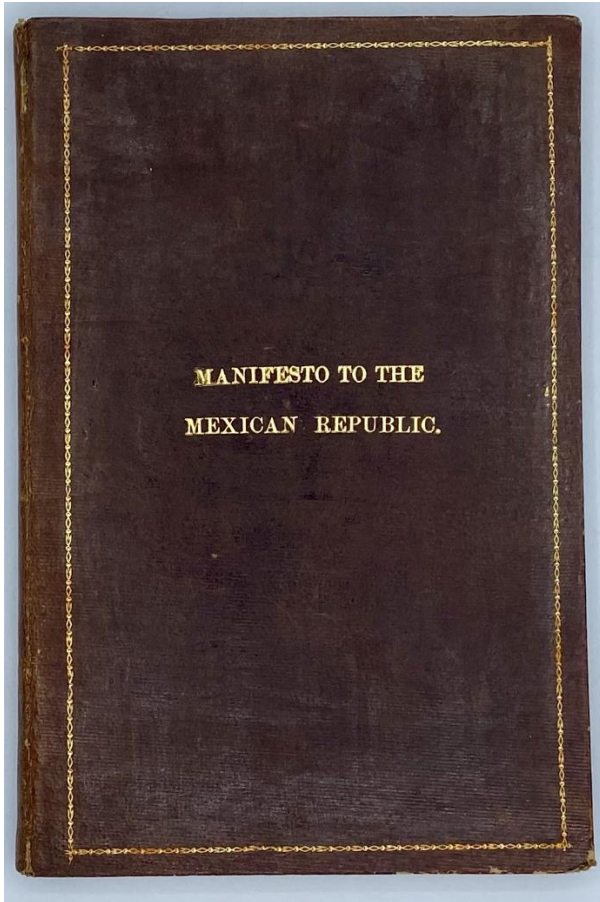

Self-published first edition of this shade and erotic fan-fiction by E. Cecil McGavin, under the pseudonym 'Kishkuman Cooper' - Kishkuman was one of the leaders of the Gadianton Robbers in the Book of Mormon - that is a lurid fictionalized biography of Brigham Young. When its author (who taught LDS Seminary and worked in the Church Historian's office) identity became known he was politely asked to destroy the print run, this episode caused him quite a bit of heartache and embarrassment in the Mormon community.

"Now Brigham, your heart is surely large enough for the new strange doctrine if Brother Joseph should ask you to step out like a brave soldier of the cross and collect a few souvenirs. If your heart could be forced to enlarge to the point where you could take another wife, I am sure that there are others organs that would cooperate in a sympathetic manner and enlarge in an equal manner for the same purpose. They don't call you tripod for nothing, you know. Your heart is not the only organ you must put into your work if you start this project at all. You must fling yourself into it with a purpose." - pg. 68-69. Collectible Mormon Books 36.

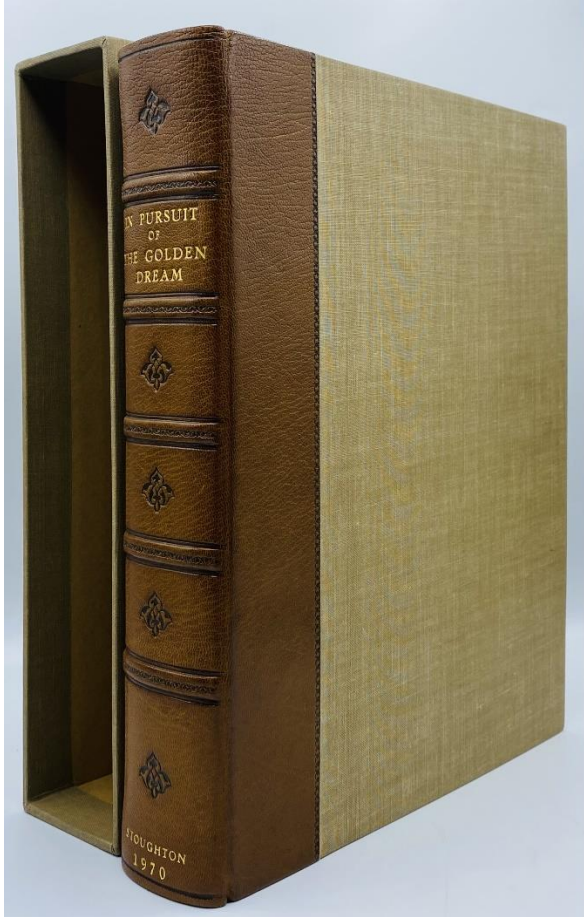

First edition in English of the first book printed in California. Jose Figueroa had been governor of Alta California since 1827. In September, 1834, Hijars and Padres arrived in Monterey as directors of a Mexican colonization project; they expected to take over the mission lands which had been secularized by the Mexican Government in 1833, as well as to assume the governorship and other offices. Figueroa refused to comply with their demands and composed his 'Manifesto a la republica Mejicana' to recount his side of the dispute and explain his own plans for secularization and colonization. 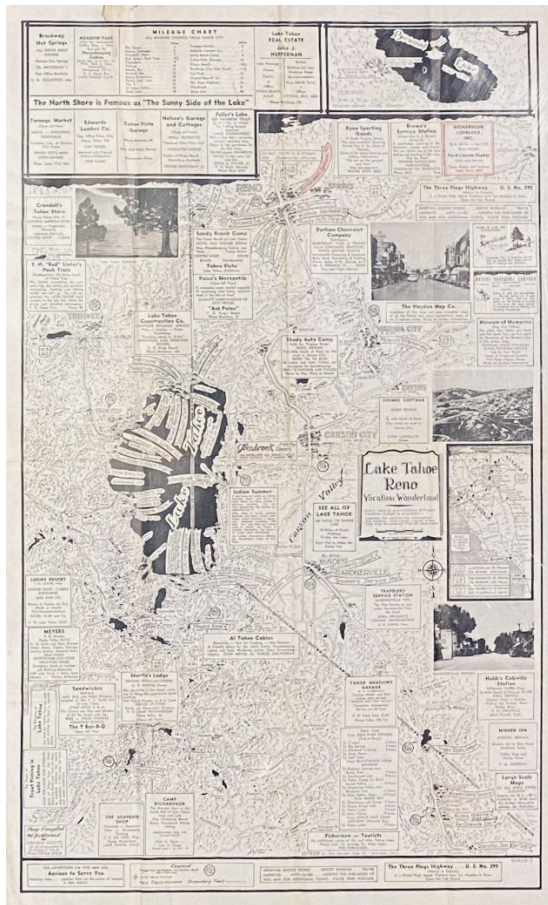

The printing of this book was limited to 100 copies, this is copy 57. Signed by Morgan on the limitation page. "If those who read Howard Gardiner's account of his experiences in California between 1849 and 1857 will thereafter return to this summary survey, they will be impressed with the immense solidity of his narrative, and the large extent of the canvas on which he has worked. I think it is quite clear that nothing in the existing literature compares with his reminiscences." - Dale Morgan.

In addition to reprinting Gardiner's work, Morgan compiled a substantial introduction consisting of a bibliographic essay on the northern mines and correspondence concerning the original publication of the reminiscences. Gardiner rounded the Horn in 1849. The narrative is pleasantly readable with the color of mining life and surroundings painted on the business-like outlines of actual mining. Particularly interesting are the recitations of his activities in the San Francisco supply trade, which fed and clothed those bound for the gold fields. Saunders 70.

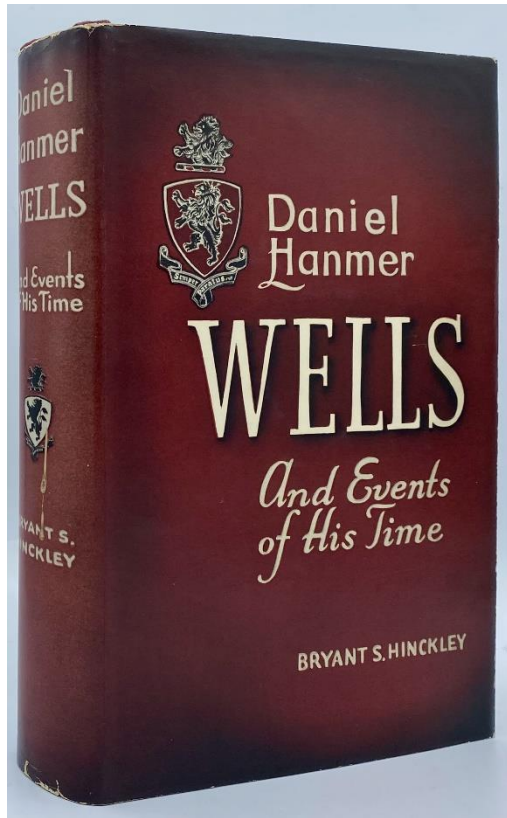

Emmet Hayden founded the Hayden Map Company in the 1920s, originally producing property maps and land surveys in the rapidly expanding Los Angeles housing market of the time. After starting up a summer guide business in Mammoth Lakes, the eternal questions about where to hunt, fish, hike, and camp, led to the evolution of the Hayden Map Company, as primarily a producer of wilderness and outdoors guides and maps.

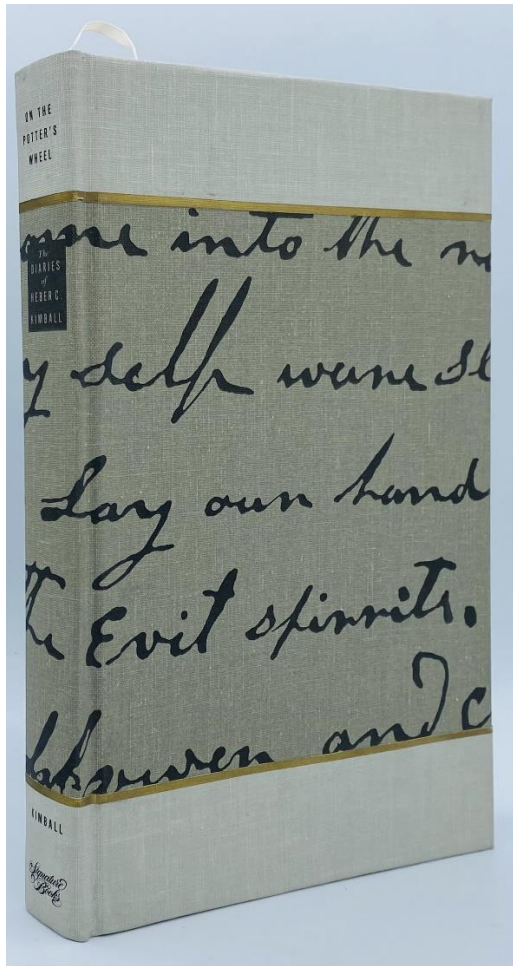

Signed by the publisher, Heber J. Grant, on the front free endsheet. Printed by the Deseret News Press. Nice copy of this biography on Daniel H. Wells (1814-1891) who was a longtime leader and Apostle who held numerous positions in Nauvoo, the State of Deseret, and the Territory of Utah during his lengthy career in public service. Heber J. Grant (1856-1945) was the seventh prophet and president of The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints, and he held the position the second longest (26 years) behind only Brigham Young (30 years). He was known for guiding the Church through some of its toughest times including the Great Depression and World War II.

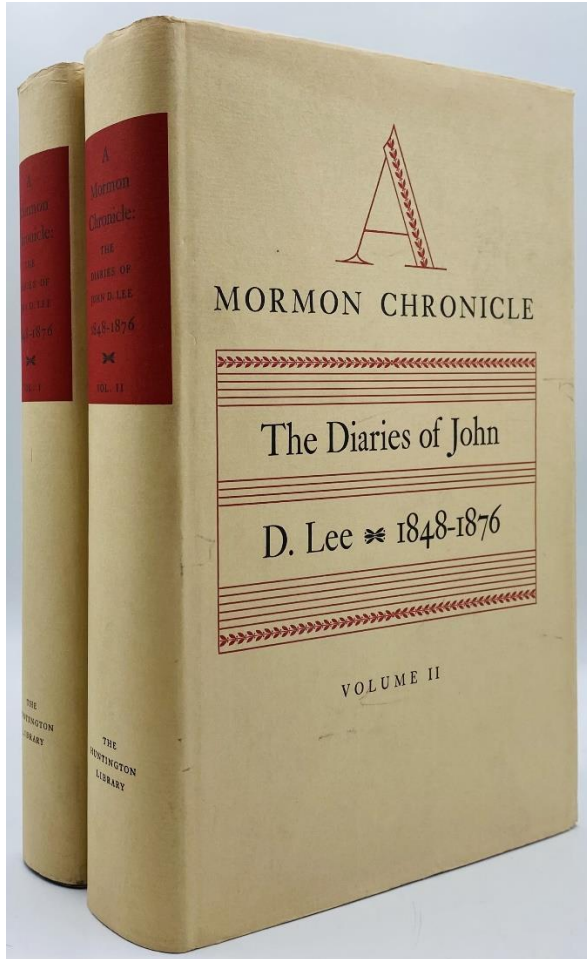

This edition was limited to 500 copies. Heber Chase Kimball (1801-1868) was an influential Mormon leader. Born in Vermont, he later moved to upstate New York where he met Brigham Young. In 1832 he joined the Church and joined the Saints in Kirtland. Kimball was part of the Zion's Camp expedition, was made an apostle, and left on the first Mormon overseas mission to England. He followed the Church to Missouri and on to Nauvoo, Illinois. After the Saints arrived in Utah, Brigham Young made Kimball his First Counselor. Kimball was very influential in the early days of the Utah Territory.

John D. Lee was the only person ever convicted of the atrocities at Mountain Meadows (nearly two decades after the event) and executed just a few months before the death of his adopted father, Brigham Young. Important work edited by Brooks and Cleland that covers the time before Lee's arrival in the Great Basin up to his arrest in 1876 for the Mountain Meadows Massacre.

These two volumes contain five hitherto unpublished diaries of John D. Lee, 'one of the most tragic, controversial, and enigmatic figures in the history of the West.' The second adopted son of Brigham Young, Lee participated as an important leader in the historic Mormon migration of 1848 to the valley of the Great Salt Lake; played a major role in the exploration and settlement of southern Utah; took an active part in the treacherous, cold-blooded Mountain Meadows Massacre of 1857. 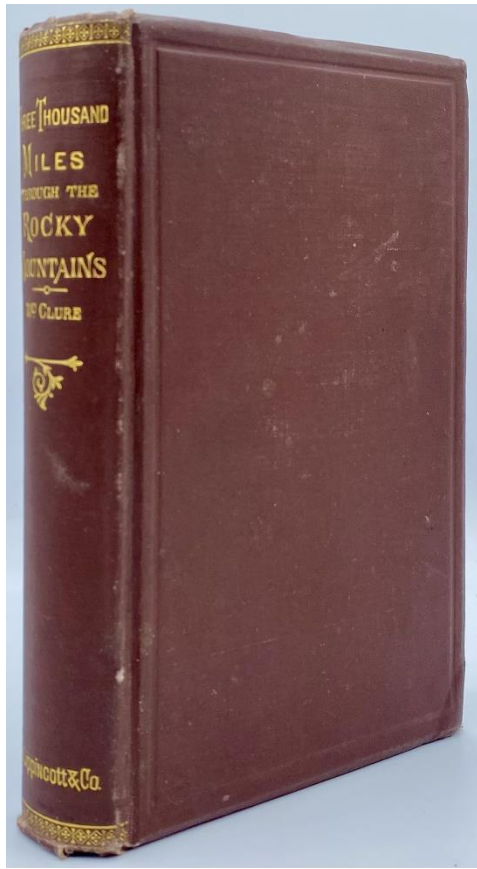

Charming illustrated map showing the auto routes through the park and marking the attractions, including the lakes, geysers, peaks (with elevations) and lodgings. One of two maps the Lindgren's produced of Yellowstone, and although presented in a jokey manner, is surprisingly accurate and useful. "Hatched & scratched by Jolly Lindgren"

The Lindgren brothers of Spokane, Washington, were commercial sign makers through the 1920s, as the economic depression of the 1930s took hold in the once prosperous Pacific Northwest, Jolly Lindgren began drawing maps of western National Parks (Yosemite, Yellowstone, Zion, Bryce, Grand Canyon, Rocky Mountain and others) sites and towns (Death Valley, Grand Coulee, Lake Tahoe, Jackson Hole, Black Hills, Puget Sound, Palm Springs) and western states (Washington, Oregon, Montana, California, Utah and likely others). These whimsical maps were named 'Hysterical Maps' and included many jokes and puns. These maps proved to be quite successful and were produced through the 1940s.

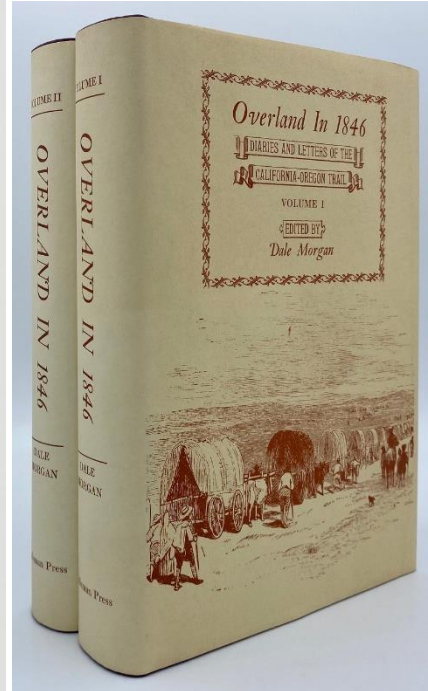

This work recounts a trip across the plains and Continental Divide into Wyoming, Idaho, Utah - with a great description of Utah and the Mormons (p.149-188) - and Montana - with description of the mines, the Bloody Bozeman, and the Montana Vigilantes - a nice western travel narrative. Alexander Kelly McClure (1828-1909) worked as a newspaper publisher and a lawyer, and was active in Republican politics. In the 1860s he invested in western mining, and as a representative of the Philadelphia-based Montana Gold and Silver Mining Company, he traveled and worked as superintendent of the mill that was built with company funds on the Oro Cache vein in Montana Territory. 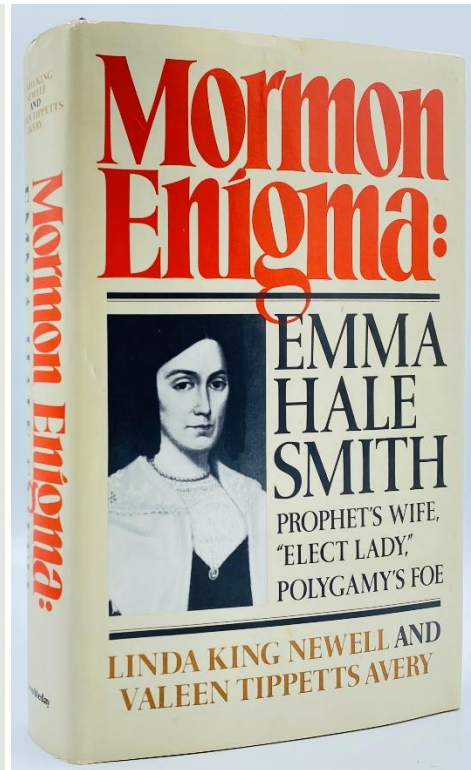

Emma Hale Smith Bidamon (1804-1879) was the first wife of Joseph Smith, and a prominent leader in the early days of the Latter Day Saint movement, both during Smith's lifetime and afterward as a member of the Reorganized Church of Jesus Christ of Latter Day Saints (now Community of Christ).

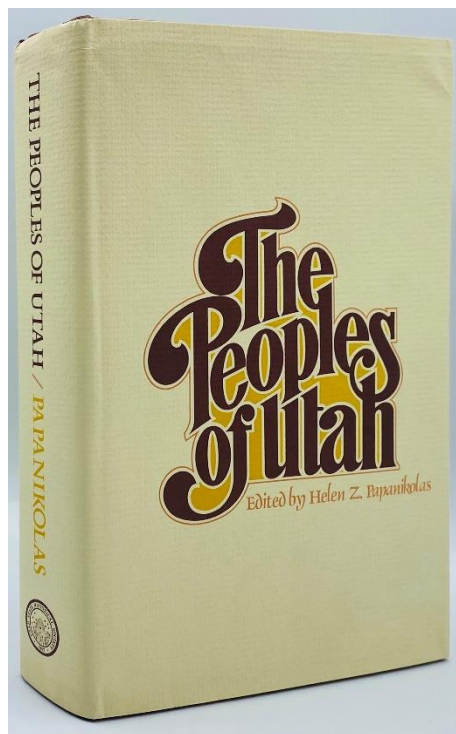

*Charles Carroll "C.C." Goodwin (1832-1917) left his native Rochester in 1852 and traveled west, settling in the foothills of California's Sierra Nevada where he operated a sawmill, taught school, and studied law with his brother Jesse. In the early 1860s he relocated to the western slope of the Sierra Nevada and continued his legal and journalistic careers. In 1880 he left for Utah to run the Salt Lake Tribune. He continued his interest in politics and was a member of the constitutional convention preceding Utah statehood, but he lost his bid to become a U. S. Senator from the new state in 1896. He wrote two well received works on his Comstock mining days in Virginia City. *The Comstock Club* (1891) and *The Wedge of Gold* (1893).*

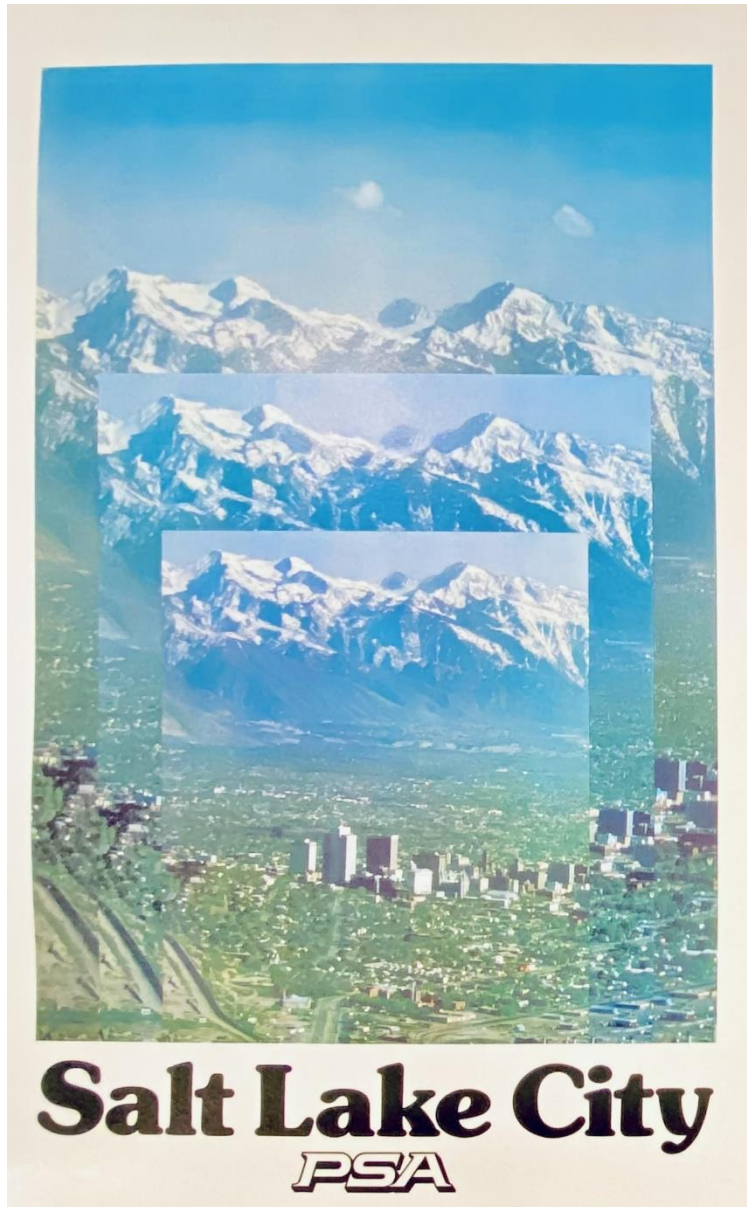

An important work that was the first major monograph dedicated to the history of the non-Mormon population in Utah.

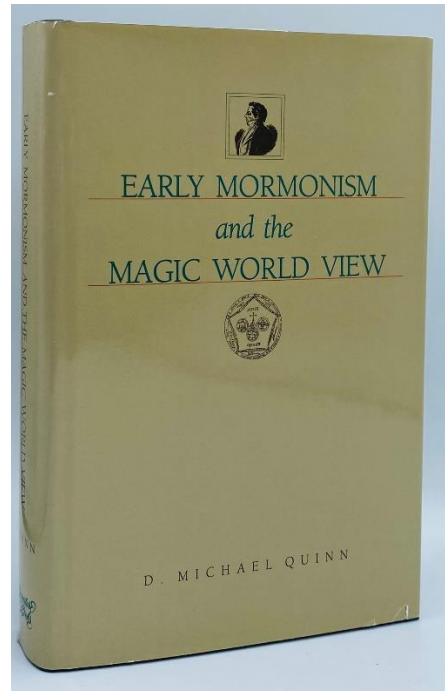
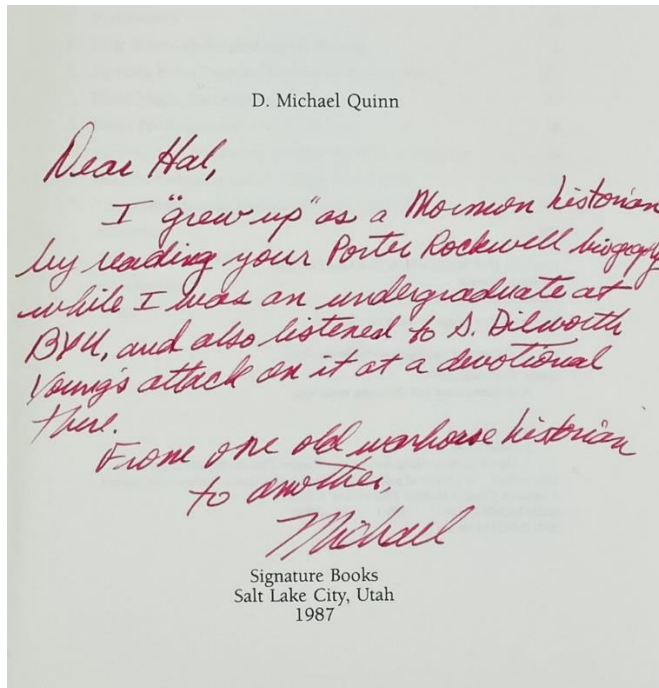

Very cool airline poster for Salt Lake City from PSA. This is not something that we have handled previously. Pacific Southwest Airlines (PSA) was a regional budget airline headquartered in San Diego, California, that operated from 1949 to 1988, and offered flights across the West Coast and Interior West. PSA called itself 'The World's Friendliest Airline' and painted a smile on the nose of its airplanes (the Grinningbirds). The Los Angeles Times called PSA "practically the unofficial flag carrier airline of California for almost forty years."

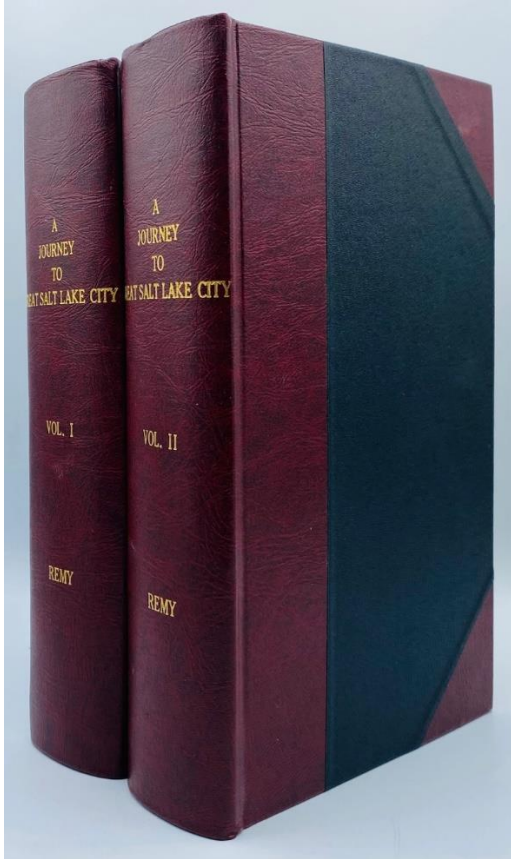

This thoroughly researched examination into occult traditions surrounding Smith, his family, and other founding Mormons cannot be understated. Among the practices no longer a part of Mormonism is the use of divining rods for revelation, astrology to determine the best times to conceive children and plant crops, the study of skull contours to understand personality traits, magic formulae utilized to discover lost property, and the wearing of protective talismans. Ninety-four photographs and illustrations accompany the text.

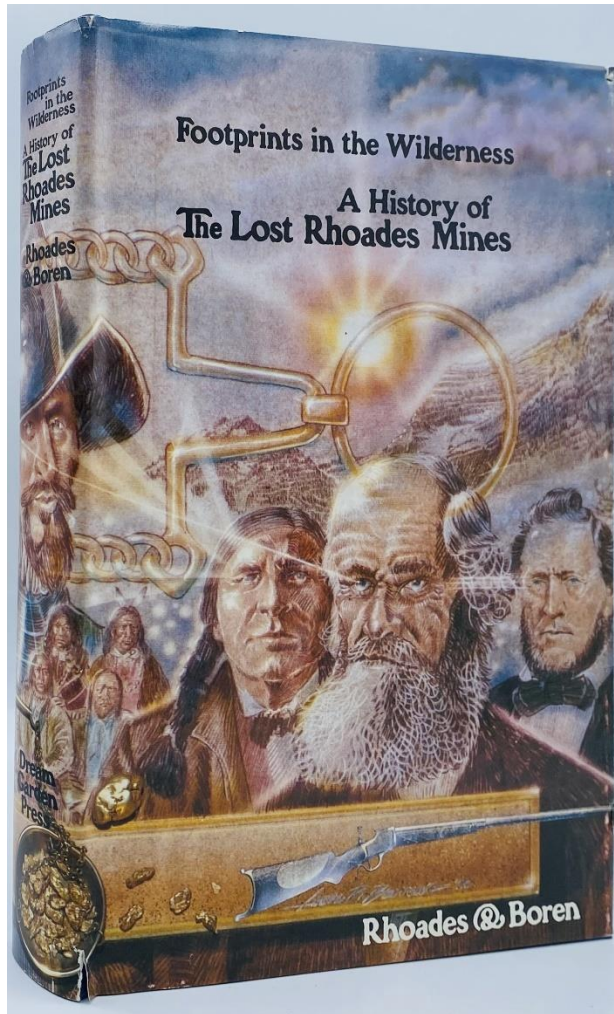

Remy and his companion Julius Lucius Brenchley traveled from San Francisco to Salt Lake City in the summer of 1855. After a month's stay they left for Los Angeles, which they reached on November 29, and then returned to San Francisco. Julius Brenchley's journey across the plains to Oregon is described in volume two. Remy wrote thirteen letters that appeared in a French newspaper (Echo du Pacifique), he later expanded upon these and 'Voyage au pays des Mormons' was published in 1860. This translated edition was printed the following year. The Frenchmen were fascinated by the Mormons, and much of this book is devoted to the new American religion and the first 172 pages of volume 2 are devoted to their comments on Mormonism.

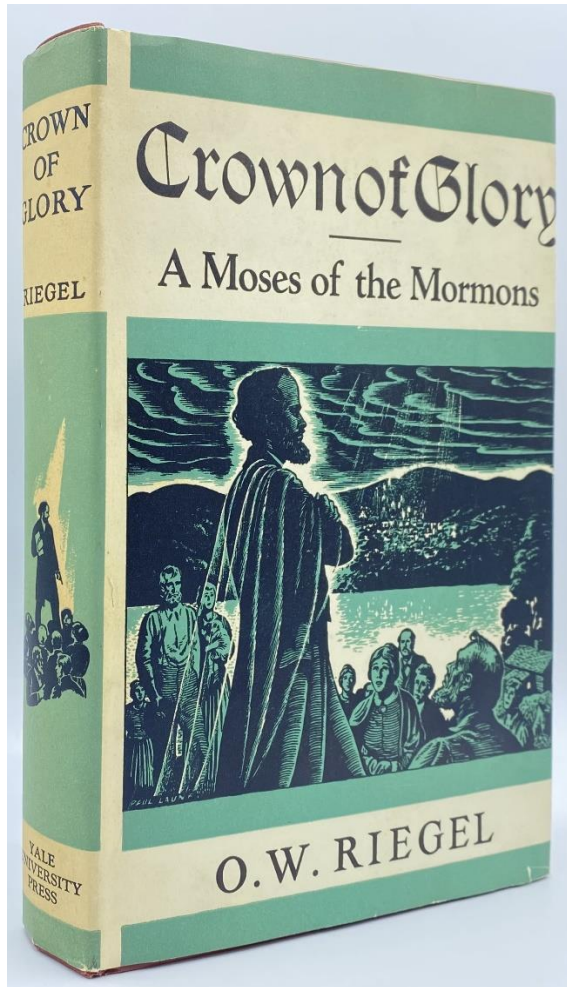

History of Thomas and Caleb Rhoades and their mysterious gold-mining operations in the Uintah Mountains of northeastern Utah. Illustrated with maps, photographs, diagrams, and drawings. According to legend In 1852, Thomas Rhoades was commissioned by President Young to salvage hidden gold known to Ute Indians. Wakara who had been baptized a member of the church, reportedly agreed to reveal the location of the gold if it was used exclusively for the benefit of the church. According to this work Rhoades made several trips into the mountains with an Indian guide. The gold supposedly was from mines abandoned by Spanish entrepreneurs who were in the territory before the 1776 Dominguez/Escalante explorations.

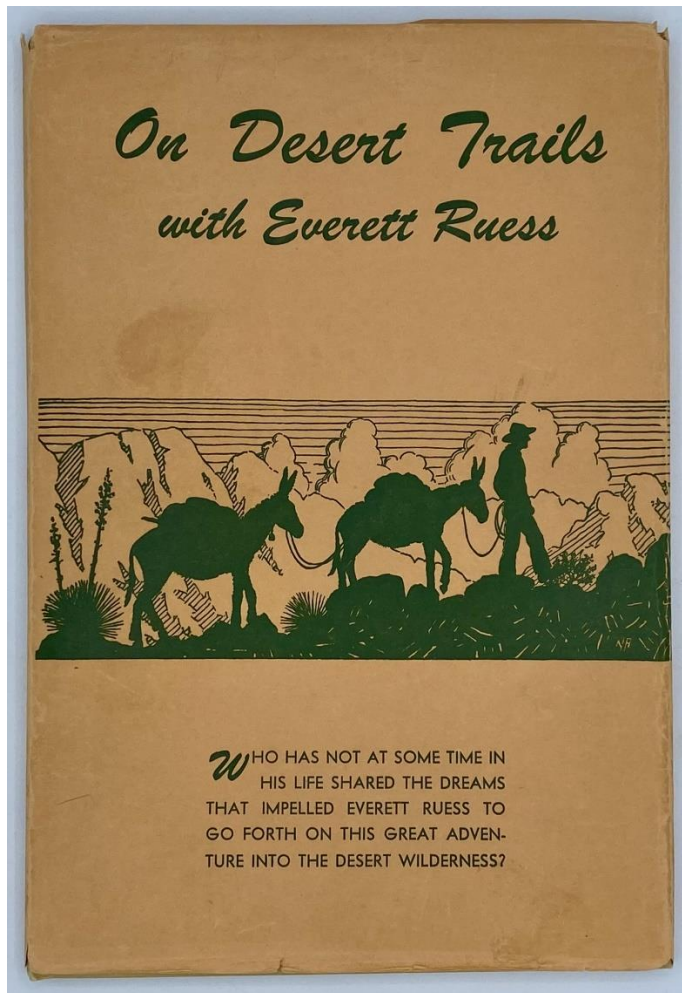

James Strang (1813-1856) was considered the prophetic successor to Joseph Smith for the Mormons of the Midwest who later formed the nucleus for the membership of what is now the Community of Christ. In the prophetic tradition of Joseph Smith, Strang similarly excavated ancient metallic plates and translated them into the Book of the Law of the Lord and the Rajah Manchou of Vorito. Like Joseph Smith, Strang instigated polygamy, secret ceremonies, baptism for the dead, and communal living. He also introduced a bloomer-like fashion for women, as well as other innovations. He had himself crowned king of the world.

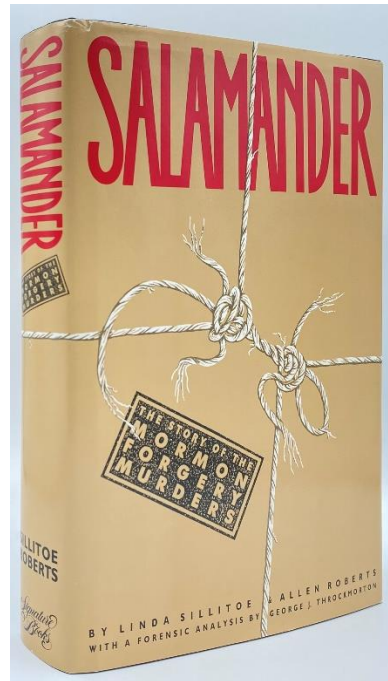
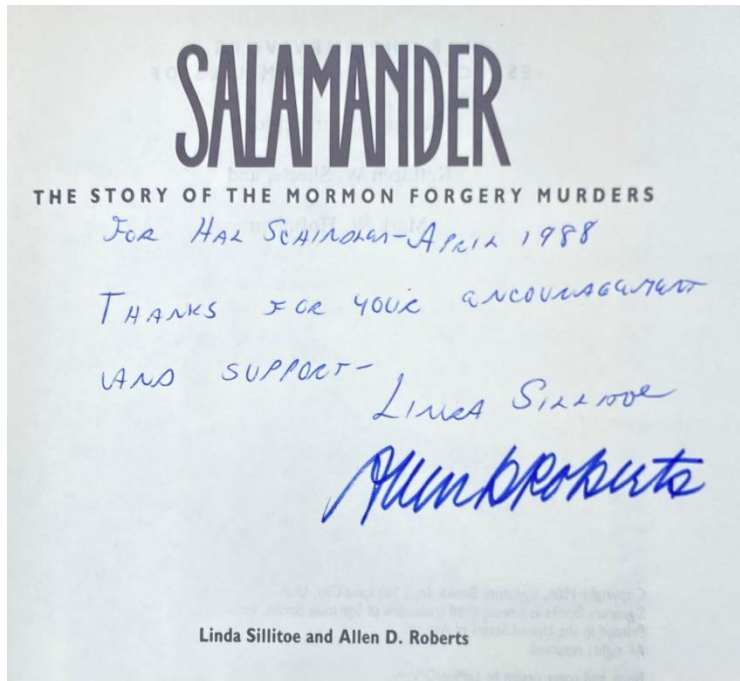

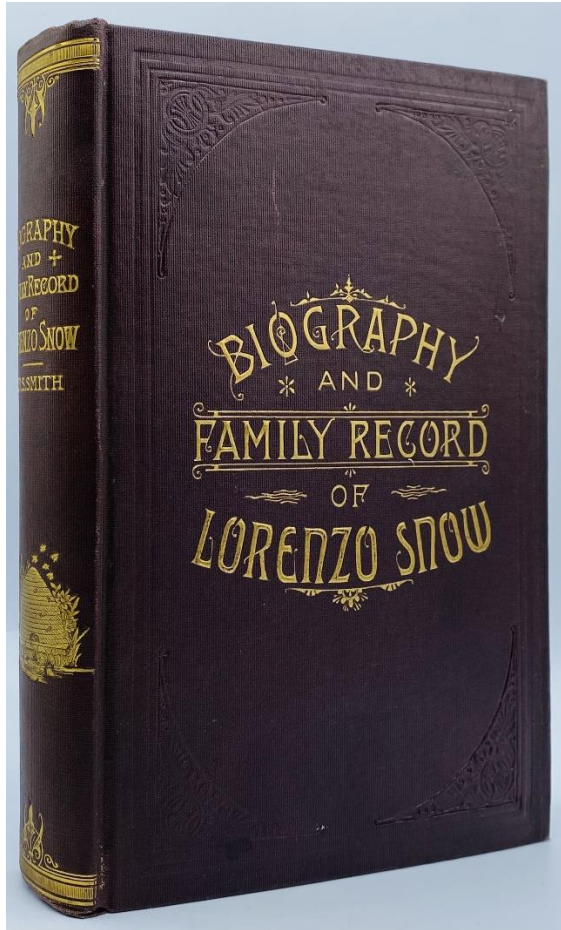

Three pipe bombs exploded in Salt Lake County in 1985, killing two people. Behind the murders lay a vast forgery scheme aimed at dozens of other victims, most prominently the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints. Mark Hofmann, a master forger, went to prison for the murders. He had bilked the church, document dealers, and collectors of hundreds of thousands of dollars over several years while attempting to alter Mormon history.

Drawing from thousands of pages of police reports, court documents, interviews, letters, and diaries, Linda Sillitoe and Allen D. Roberts unravel the disturbing secrets behind the century's most successful forger, Mark W. Hofmann. A con artist who confessed in plea bargaining to murder and fraud, Hofmann eluded exposure by leading American document authenticators, as well as FBI technicians, Library of Congress curators, historians, and polygraph experts.

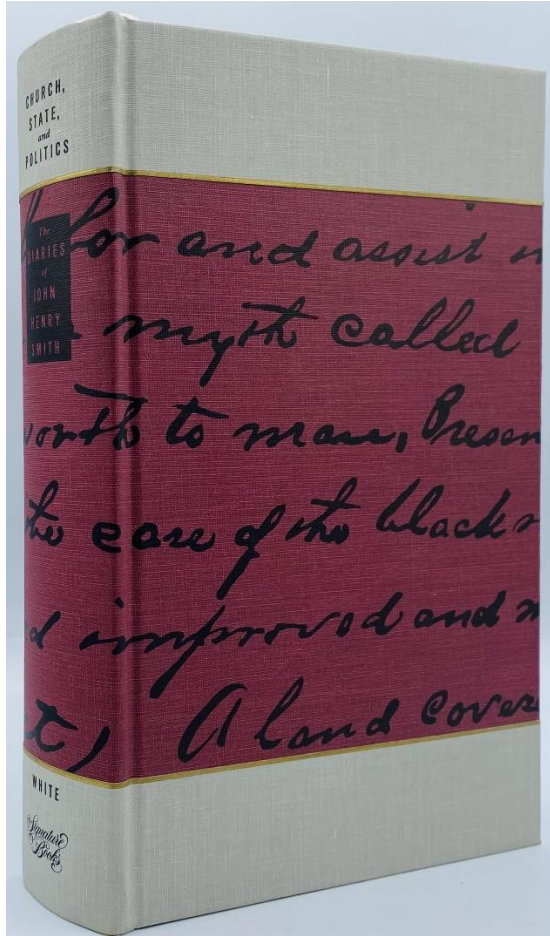

A nicer than usually seen copy of this biography of the fifth President of the L.D.S. Church written by his esteemed sister. Lorenzo Snow (1814-1901) devoted his life to his religion. A colonizer, missionary, educator, legislator, cultural arts enthusiast, husband, and father, Snow originally planned a career in the military, but his conversion to the Mormon faith refocused his plans. For fifty-two years he was an apostle of the LDS Church and served as president of the more than 250,000 members at the turn of the century. A significant force in colonizing northern Utah and one of its representatives in the territorial legislature, Snow presided over the settlement of Box Elder County for more than twenty years. He named his community Brigham City after his close friend, LDS Church president Brigham Young. Howes S591. Flake/Draper 7835.

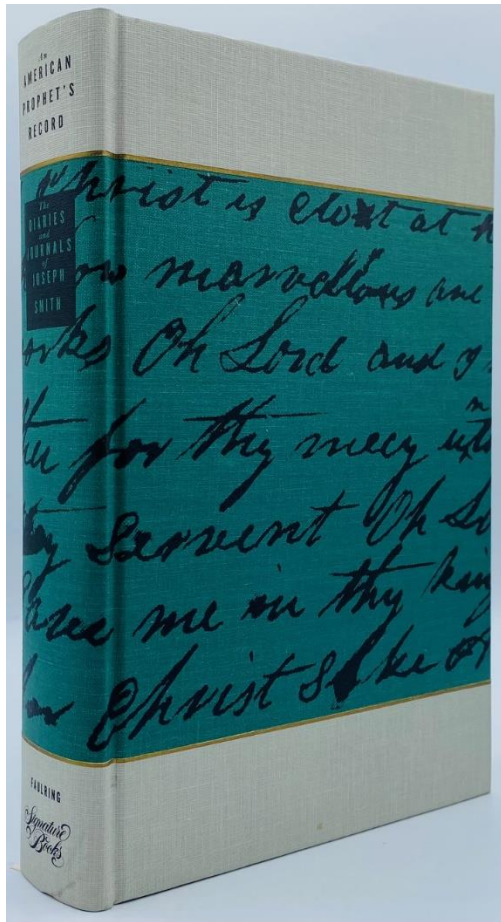

This edition was limited to 500 numbered copies. John Henry Smith (1849-1911) served as a Mormon apostle from 1880 to 1910, while simultaneously an officer in several prominent businesses, everything from U & I Sugar to the Co-op Wagon and Machinery Company, as well as Saltair Beach and the Salt Lake Theater Company. He helped found Utah's Republican party and was a delegate to the state constitutional convention. A pragmatist, he also equivocated on post-1890 polygamy in testimony before the U.S. Senate. His comments on the inner workings of the LDS hierarchy are especially candid. He documents the excommunication of Apostle Albert Carrington for adultery, the release of Apostle Moses Thatcher for political differences and morphine addiction, and the excommunication of Apostle John W. Taylor and suspension of Apostle Matthias Cowley for insubordination. He relates how church ownership of Zions Savings Bank led to interest-free loans and deferred payments for high-ranking church leaders.

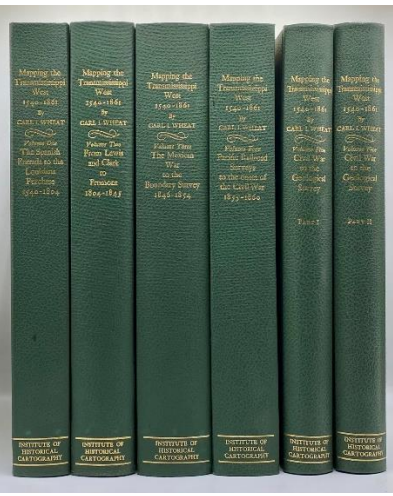

This edition was limited to 500 copies. Throughout these diaries significant events are recorded, such as the first ritualistic washings, perfumings, anointings, and washing of feet; early sealings and polygamous marriages (often recorded in shorthand); meetings of the Council of Fifty; and other important episodes in the history of the development of the Restoration church. Joseph Smith, Jr. (1805-1844) was born in Sharon, Vermont. In 1820 he received a heavenly visitation of God the Father and His Son, Jesus Christ. In 1830, Smith founded the Church of Jesus Christ. After being driven from three different states and suffering much persecution, Joseph Smith and his brother, Hyrum Smith (1800-1844), were murdered by a mob in Carthage, Illinois on June 27, 1844.

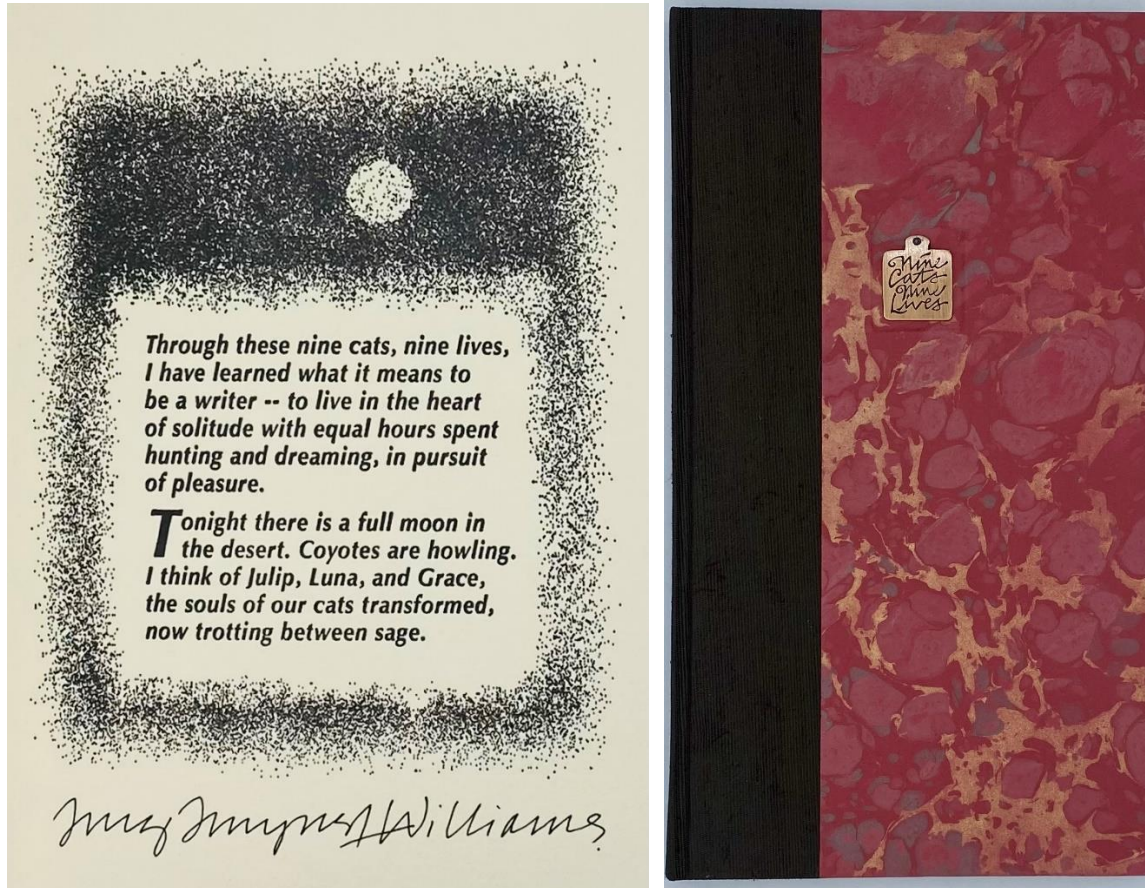

Volume 1: The Spanish Entrada to the Louisiana Purchase, 1540-1804. - Volume 2: From Lewis and Clark to Fremont, 1804-1845. - Volume 3: From the Mexican War to the Boundary Surveys, 1846-1854. - Volume 4: From the Pacific Railroad Surveys to the Onset of the Civil War, 1855-1860. - Volume 5: From the Civil to the Geological Survey.

This five-volume work describes the maps of Western America from the earliest cartographic conjectures to Spanish explorations of the fifteenth century, through early exploration and overland travel up to the beginnings of the great surveys and the Civil War. Morgan's contribution to this classic work was greater than is generally recognized. From the forewords to the individual volumes it seems that Morgan functioned as an unofficial editor and research fellow. Wheat gratefully acknowledged his liberal contributions of information, footnotes, and editorial work. Of the text itself, chapter 36 on Mormon maps in the fourth volume, and all of volume five (two books) was Morgan's work. Additionally, because Wheat was victimized by several strokes, about one-half of the second volume and ninety percent of the third is apocryphally attributed to Morgan's authorship, though he claimed only the complete volume five on his own bibliography in the Morgan Papers. Signed by the illustrator, Pat 'The Cat' Eddington, and the binder, Susan Makov, on the limitation page. Short work from the noted writer, where she recounts the lives of her nine cats, each is accompanied by a portrait on the facing page. Terry Tempest Williams (b.1955) is a celebrated author and conservationist, whose work has been widely anthologized. She is a member of the American Academy of Arts and Letters, and currently the Writer-in-Residence at the Harvard Divinity School.

Green Cat Press began in 1985 as a collaboration in the production of limited edition letterpress broadsides and books, screenprints and woodcut prints from original writing and/or drawings by artists and authors. Began by artist/ printer Susan Makov and artist Patrick Eddington, the press is now under the ownership of Susan Makov. The press has attracted well-known published authors and artists such as Margaret Atwood, Ray Bradbury, William T. Wiley, Terry Tempest Williams, MFK Fisher, Diane Ackerman, Billy Collins and Wendell Berry.

Earth First! was an environmental group founded by Dave Foreman, Ron Kezar, Mike Roselle, Howie Wolke, and Bart Koehler in 1980 as an alternative to more mainstream groups such as the Sierra Club and the Wilderness Society. EF! describes itself as "pure, hard-line, radical," and advocates supplementing lobbying practices with more direct tactics such as "demonstrations" and "confrontations." In addition to supporting traditional conservation, EF! calls for the re-creation of wilderness through the construction of a national system of ecological preserves in which dams, roads, and other traces of human activity will be removed. "No Compromise in Defense of Mother Earth." Rare.
